Coach Jim Mitchell's roundballers raced to a 14-point haltime bulge, 40-26, and were never to be stopped as Eulis Stephens put on a one-man show in a two-min-tune span before the reserves filed in.

Stephens, who topped both teams with 24 points, dunked, slammed and cranked a pair of fast breaks which brought the home crowd to its feet in appreciation. Two other Pioneers were in double figures as Tim Kramer talled 14 points and 11 rebounds, while Craig Harts dropped six-of-ten field goal attempts and two-of-two free shots to match Kramer.

Although he had only three points, "Dollar" Bill Scott Played 29 minutes and mustered 10 assists and nine steals.

"Bill did a fine job shooting with his left hand and passing off," said Mis-hell about Scott, who suffered a fractured elbow in the Pioneers' opening game.
The Pioneers also played without 7-0 Norwegian center Bjorn Rossow who suffered a sprained ankle in practice. Rossow's cast has been removed, but Mitchell indicates he won't be able to play hard until next year.

WSU cops Commuter Bowl


