

'Citizens Review' Rejuvenated

Southfield Stadium Plans Still Alive

FARMINGTON Township Trustees received a report Monday night on a rezoning being considered by the Southfield City Council which would prevent location of a domed stadium at the proposed site.

Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan attended the Southfield City Council meeting and after it was over drove to the township hall to report the results.

THE SOUTHFIELD Council Monday night held a public hearing on a zoning proposal it initiated two years ago. The rezoning proposal involves the land suggested for a new stadium which is an area north of 11 Mile, south of I-96 and bounded by Inkster and Telegraph Rds.

The council was considering the possibility of rezoning the

area to ERO, a high-rise office district, and a few areas to multiple.

The Southfield Planning Commission had recommended passage of the ERO and multiple zonings. If the council agreed to such action it would, in effect, block the stadium since it could not be built in those zoning districts.

But after the hearing was concluded, the council voted 5-1 to table the matter for six weeks for further information.

BRENNAN REPORTED that most of the residents attending the hearing spoke in favor of the ERO and multiple zones as opposed to a possible future rezoning of the area.

He noted a couple of residents described the council's proposed rezoning as "patchwork."

Brennan reported three of the Southfield councilmen, including the council president, urged "caution" in rezoning the property at this time.

The three councilmen met the problem of access could be resolved through a commitment from the state highway department for an interchange at Inkster and I-96.

If access is provided, they felt there might be "other" uses of a higher category for the property than ERO and multiple. They did not mention the word "stadium" noted Brennan.

Brennan was sent to the Southfield meeting by the Farmington Board of Trustees to represent the township. He arrived to report his findings at the conclusion of Monday's township meeting.

DURING ITS meeting, the township board voted to rezone to office use a 2.6 acre parcel on 13 Mile between North

Farmington High School and Antioch Lutheran Church.

The board also set a public hearing for July 14 to set the supplemental final for a paving project on Robinson. The bids for the project came in 23 per cent higher than original engineer estimates.

The board set July 7 as a meeting date for a committee of the whole to discuss the scope and functioning of the proposed Citizens Review Board.

Once established, the Citizens Review Board will be empowered to investigate complaints lodged against the township police department.

The board will meet as a committee of the whole so it can discuss in private and try to reach a consensus in opinion about how the review-board should operate.

OCC Board Studies '67-70 Faculty Contract

FARMINGTON Faculty ratification of the proposed contract and the appointment of two vice presidents were among the business handled by the Oakland Community College Board of Trustees at the board's monthly meeting June 19.

Following approximately four months of negotiation, the Oakland Community College Faculty Association ratified the proposed contract for 1969-70. OCCFA President Richard Thompson reported officially to the Board.

The board can now either recommend changes or ratify the existing document which would then be the contract for the coming year.

The two present executive directors at the college who were appointed to the newly-created vice presidencies are W.H. Nikkel, from executive director-Business Services to vice president - Business Services, and Dr. Michael J. Tucci, from executive director - Systems Analysis to vice president-Administrative Services.

Nikkel, 42, joined the college in May, 1968 following five years as chief business administrator for Macomb County Community College. He has a BS degree in accounting and finance from Detroit College of Business and a MA in administration from Michigan State University.
