CHARLOTTE ADA BOND

Mrs. Charlotte Bond, 97, of Farmington Hills died Dec. 13. Funeral services were Dec. 16 at the Thayer-Rock Funeral Home and burial was in the North Farmington Cemetery.

A resident of the Farmington area for almost 90 years, Mrs. Bond was honored as one of the older residents of the vicinity at the first Farmington Founders' Festival. She was active in many clubs, including the Order of Eastern Star where she was a member for more than 76 years. She served as second Worthy Matron, secretary for 33 years, as first president of the Past Matrons' Club, and as president of the Oakland County Association of the Order of Eastern Star.

She served as treasurer, president and parliamentarian of the Farmington Women's Club, which she joined in 1926. She was also president of the North Farmington Cemetery Association and a member of the First United Methodist Church of Farmington.

As the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Wolfe, she came to the Warner farm in Farmington, later moving to their Livonia farm. She attended Detroit and Northville schools, graduating from Northville High School in 1898 and teaching school in Northville and Livonia for two years.

Married to Isaac Bond in 1900, they lived on their farm on Orchard Lake Road until his death in 1955.

Art's audit paid

Fred Lichtman's ghost haunted Farmington Hills council chambers this week, but it was to no avail.

In a 5-1 vote, the council voted to pay the \$390 audit fee for the now defunct Farmington Area Arts Council. Voting against the proposal was Councilman Keith Deacon.

Lichtman, who relinquished his council seat last year, was the chief opponent to paying the council's audit. The Arts Council was dissolved after the formation of the Farmington Area Arts Commission, an official city board.

Under state law, the Arts Council was required to have an audit of its financial records. The outspoken Lichtman became known in his last days on the council for his opposition to paying the bill.

Although voting to pay for the audit, the council was warned by City Attorney Paul Bibeau that their action probably could be successfully challenged in the courts.

"The Arts Council was a private, non-profit corporation. It doesn't even exist. You can't use public funds for private organizations," he said.

IF THIS is paid and the payment is challenged in court, the council could end up paying the bill," said Bibeau, although he admitted that a challenge is highly unlikely.

Although the amount to be paid for

the audit was small, many on the council felt it was the obligation of the city council to pay for the audit.

"If we can't stand up for the people who serve on our city commissions, then we would be remiss in our duty," said Councilman Joe Alkateeb.

He maintained it would be difficult to get persons to serve on city commissions in the future if the city didn't stand behind such decisions.

"We have no intention of violating the laws of Michigan. But letting this issue go on and on would just be compounding the error," he said.

The "error" began when the Arts Council dissolved and donated its remaining funds to the city—some \$3,000. Six hundred dollars of those funds were private monies which should have been withheld from city coffers to pay for the audit, according to Arts Commission officials.

Former Hills Councilman Robert Amori, who represented the Arts Commission at this week's meeting, defended the allocation.

"This is like a resident paying a sewer charge on an estimate that was too high. Later that resident would be given back the difference," he said.

An amused city official remarked afterwards that he had expected Lichtman to fly from Washington D.C. under his own arm power to protest the action. Lichtman is a lobbyist on Capitol Hill.
