South end bargains for funds

"I've lived in this area since 1946 and many of the conditions that existed then, still exist," he said.

"Unless something is done to improve the quality of living, we're just not going to be looking towards the future."

He suggested that funds be used to hire a community organizer to deal with broken homes, family life problems and delinquency.

A Section 36 resident outlined some of the adverse living conditions experienced in that section of the city. He

suggested that already established ordinances could be followed to rid the area of its problems.

"Either get out the slum landlords or have them fix up the property," he said.

Overflowing septic tanks, broken drainage tiles and flooded roads all are problems which haunt that area, according to many of its residents.

A woman complained that her house insurance had been cancelled because Section 36 is without fire hydrants. The system was built privately back in the

1830s, according to city officials, and the drainage pipes are too small to handle hydrants. The entire system would have to be replaced to install hydrants.

While many residents expressed pleasure at the program's past performance, others objected that enough money hadn't been allocated for housing rehabilitation grants and loans.

Approximately \$50,000 has been allocated for housing rehab, but that money has been put in reserve, city officials said.

IN LIEU of that money, funds from Oakland County and another federal program, totaling \$100,000, has been used for rehabilitation.

Michael Dornan, community development program administrator, says 20 claims for loans or grants have been processed with that \$100,000.

But Section 36 activist George Roberts says more of the funds could have been spent if more persons would have known about the program in past years.

Bloodmobile parks in city

The Red Cross is urging Farmington residents to give blood for a good cause. Holidays and several heavy snowfalls have impaired blood collection efforts in southeastern Michigan.

To replenish its supply of blood, the Red Cross is operating drives at locations around the Farmington area. The group must collect 900-1,000 pints of blood a day to meet the needs of patients in more than 80 hospitals. The recent slump in donations has raised this goal.

Persons in good health, between the ages of 17-65 are eligible to donate blood.

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be at Botsford Hospital, 2650 Grand River, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Thursday. Bloodmobiles will be stationed from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Feb. 18, at the Finnish Cultural Center, 35200 Eight Mile Road, and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Feb. 19, at the Universalist Unitarian Church, 25301 Halstead.


