LONDON, England — "Who's for a little tea?"

Visualize you're at Tiger Stadium or Olympia
or Cobo Arena . . . Or maybe watching the sandlotters perform at Ford Field in Livonia.

"Time out," yells the umpire or the referee.

Play comes to a standstill. The athletes pause . . . and a tea truck moves onto the battle scene. Up in the stands, the fans are taking their tea breaks, too.

Back in Observerland, you'd think that to be pretty strange. But the other afternoon we went up to the Lord Cricket Grounds, a mile or two away from our hotel.

We wanted to show the Harold Kleins, who are traveling with us, what cricket is all about. It's the kind of a sport you don't see in Detroit or New York or anywhere else in the United States.

But, it's quite an attraction in England, Australia and elsewhere.

The games — or matches, we should say — aren't always settled in one day. Sometimes they take two or three.

Cricket, we might add, is played with wickets ... and the idea is to try and knock the ball past the rival goalie. It's played on grass ... pretty fancy-looking grass, too.

The sticks the players use one supposes are the closest things most Britons see to an American bat used in baseball.

BASEBALL ISN'T too popular here. The GI's

BASEBALL ISN'T too popular here. The GI's over the years have brought some baseball to the British Islands and we remember umpiring at Wembley Stadium one afternoon before 49,000 fans.

Wembley is the home of soccer in London. They draw crowds of over 90,000 . and soccer here is called football. But again, it's not like the football we see Bentley or Plymouth or Garden City Highs play.

It's pure and simple soccer, like the Cougars gave us before they died... and when soccer is played in England, the crowds generally exceed what most football games, including the pros, draw in the States.

They also play a lot of rugby around here, a sport which has made some inroads in the U.S., especially at eastern colleges. But there's a sport we've never seen.

The British, of ourse, have their horse racing and its different from what you see at the DRC track on Middle Belt Road.

For one thing, the horses run clockwise or the other way. If they start in front of you, they go left ... not right.

Then, too, there are bookmakers all around the place. You bet with them, instead of with the official track sellers.

And you collect the same way.

HERE, TOO, AND NOT FAR from the heart of London stands Wimbledon, next to Forest Hills in New York, the most famed tennis center in the world

world.

It's at Wimbledon this week that the greatest players are engaged in the annual Wimbledon Open, which we know is receiving good play in the Free Press and News.

It's to Wimbledon, too, we will go and maybe sneak a spot in one of the NBC cameras which will be telecasting the matches back to Channel 4 in Detroit over the weekend.
