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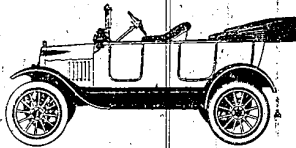

Teachers' Examination.

The next regular teachers' examination for Oakland county will be held at the court house in the city of Pontiac on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 26, 27, 28, 1917, beginning at 8 o'clock central time of each day.

Applicants may write for first, second or third grade certificates at this examination.

The examination in reading for this examination is based upon the outline in reading as given in the state course of study for elementary schools.

A portion of the questions in grammar and physiology will be taken from the reading circle books for 1917.

All candidates for certificates must be 18 years of age as required by law. Under the new law all beginners who are writing for third grade certificates must have had six weeks training in some school approved by the superintendent of public instruction.

The following schools are approved: Ypsilanti normal, Mt. Pleasant normal, Kal amazoo normal, Ferris Institute, Agricultural college and State University.

Candidates writing at the April examination will be granted certificates in August if they pass the required standings. Teachers asking the reading circle work, or those attending the summer schools will be excused from writing on the following subjects: Reading and Theory and Art. Teachers wishing reading circle books should order them at once. All applicants must write the examination with pen and ink.

An average of 88 per cent with a minimum of 66 per cent is required of third grade applicants. For second grade certificates an average of 85 per cent with a minimum of 70 per cent is required.

The following program will be followed at the examination: Thursday a m. Orthography and Spelling. Arithmetic, written and mental, Theory and Art. Thursday p. m. Geography, Government, U. S. History. Friday a. m. Grammar, Physiology, Reading; Friday p. m. Penmanship, Agriculture, School Law, Course of Study, Geometry.

Saturday a. m. Algebra, Botany, General History, Physics. Saturday p. m. First grade subjects only.

All candidates must register to days in advance of the examination. Registration cards may be obtained from the school commissioner. All applicants for renewal must hold two credits on life certificate. This rule applies to normal certificates as well as to county certificates. Early notice is here given that all candidates may be prepared for the examination.
