Band To March Scouts Off For Jamboree

FARMINGTON Scout Troop #389 of Farmington, sponsored by Martin Park Methodist Church, will leave July 10 for Faragut, Idaho to attend the seventh National Boy Scout Jamboree.

The troop will take 40 boys, 35 of whom are members of the marching band, and nine adults. The boys will be under the direction of George Fletcher, scoutmaster; James Harst, assistant scoutmaster; Lindsay Chalmers, bandmaster and assistant scoutmaster; and Frank Dunsmore, drum major and assistant scoutmaster, with junior assistants Daniel Davis and Stephen Pardon.

The 40 boys will be divided into four patrols led by Mark Lewis, Gary May, Ken Lott, and Robert Fisher with Scott Dolan as senior patrol leader.

The troop will travel by car and van with Richard Angelo, Richard Patton, Bud Burgstahler, William Alegnani, George Thomas and Paul Sechler as drivers. The transportation for the entire trip has been donated by General Motors Oldsmobile, Ford Motor, Town and Country Dodge of Farmington and Chrysler Corporation.

On the trip west the boys will stop at Madison, Wis.; Faragut Falls, Minn.; Glendive, Mont., where they will tour the Badlands; Shelby, Mont., and

Kalispell, Mont., where they will spend a day at Glacier National Park.

During their travels they will stay in Methodist churches at each of their stops where meals and lodging will be provided. Their scout band will perform for these church congregations across the country. Then band will also play for the Elks Club State Convention in Butte, Mont.

During their week at the jamboree with the more than 40,000 other Scouts and Scouters from all over the world, they will be involved in activities such as boating, canoeing, archery, swimming, riflery, badge trading and hiking the Rocky Mountain slopes.

The banner that will be posted at the entrance to the campsite depicts the theme for the jamboree -- "Building to Serve". The art work was done by Sister Mary Ignatius of Our Lady of Mercy High School in Farmington.

During this trip the entire function of the troop is based upon the performances of its marching band. The 35-piece band with Lin Chalmers as bandmaster will perform about once a day at flag raisings and lowerings, and at the skill-orama arena. They will play for President Richard Nixon and Lady Baden Powell. On Saturday they will perform for all of the service club members

which will number in the thousands.

The return trip will bring the boys through Butte, Mont., Miles City, Mont., Fargo, N.D., Wisconsin Dells, Wis., and on home by July 27 with enough memories to last a lifetime.

Duke Bids On Inkster Parcel

A bid of \$8,000 by Thomas A. Duke of Farmington and William Shillings of Detroit for 20,000 square feet of land at the northwest corner of Interstate 696 and Inkster in Farmington Township has been accepted by the Michigan State Highway Commission.

The bid was approved by the State Administrative Board before the land can be transferred.

The township site was included in a Department of State Highways section of 22 parcels of surplus land in Macomb, Oakland and St. Clair Counties which brought in high bids totaling \$23,785--nearly \$97,500 more than the appraised value.

The department said the increase was a result of competitive bidding for several of the parcels.

A parcel of 6.2 acres along Interstate 696 in Southfield, valued at \$800, was withdrawn from the auction at the request of the city.

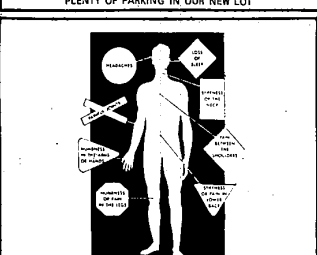

"But in the total environment, man is the only animal who doesn't fit--he destroys his environment. He has complete sympathy toward the natural environment. The public has got to get interested in preservation of our resources."
He continues: "We've eliminated the mountain lion in Michigan, the lynx and the wolf. We have done a good job on the bobcat, the fox, hawk and owl. But we did a better job on everything with DDT than we

did with the gun."

WHILE he is vehement about DDT, the naturalist also takes exception with Farmington schools.

"Farmington has no outdoor education program when every community around us has had one for 10 years. Working with children is the best way in the world to bring the need for conservation home to the parents. They become aware of what is happening in their community."

Thorn's own children, including young Dale who sleeps with wolves, are well-versed in the need for conservation and the ways of wildlife.

Daughter Sharon (Cooke), says her father can handle all kinds of animals as well as any animal trainer and son, Dennis, with Army Intelligence in Thailand, keeps writing his father to ask if he should send home a python.
