REPRESENTATIVES of sister clubs in Detroit, Grosse Pointe, Ferndale, Wayne, Dearborn, and Macomb County were also present along with Mayor and Mrs. Harvey Moskale of Livonia, Kenwood Women's Club and Kivans Club officers to honor the Redford group.

Frances Moore, president of Livonia Soroptimists the past two years, was cited by her successor for 1969-70, Elsie Wright, for her outstanding work in extension of the organization with establishment of the Redford club and for broadening the interests of Livonia members in the international organization's world wide programs.

The membership is now 45,000 in 1,500 clubs throughout the world.

Members are selected from among business executives, proprietors and managers and from professional women, providing for mutual assistance in community projects, chiefly in areas not otherwise covered.
