Paid for His Carelessness.

When he went to a pasture
here Sunday to bring his four
cows in, George Shoemaker, a
well known farmer of Lakeville

learned later however that a
neighbor had been cleaning out

the fence and the cows found it. The
material was cleaving to their
taste so they consumed all that
remained in the can and in a
short time died. Deputy Sheriff

investigate but the matter was
dropped when the neighbor
promptly paid \$260 to Shoemaker
when he learned of the affair,
that being the estimated value of
the cattle.—Rochester Era.

Every Farmer Raise a Calf.

"Raise a calf," has been adopted
as a slogan by the animal
husbandry department of the
Michigan Agricultural College, to
boost beef production in Michi-
gan. The department declares
that if every farmer possessing
50 acres of land or over raises
and fattens but one additional
animal, the move will in 1918 in-
crease the state's dressed meat
supply by at least 62,000,000
pounds for shipment outside, or
will provide 21 pounds more per
year for every individual within
the state.

Many farmers have been laugh-
tering their calves, but the rais-
ing of one animal would place a
burden on none. Dairy farmers
should keep their male calves.
The animals can be raised and
fattened on a 50 acre farm with-
out the cost of feeding ever be-
ing felt.

The step would go a long way
towards enabling the state to en-
large its food supply.

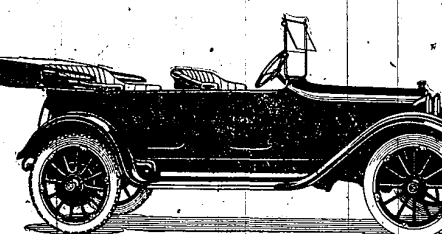
