Council Proceedings

Firemen's Hall, Farmington, Mich., July 14, 1917. Special meeting of the Common Council of the Village of Farmington, called for the purpose of discussing and arriving at definite plans for the repair of the McGee hill road.

Meeting called to order by President George Francis.

Trustees present: Nichols Ely, Pauline and Walters; also the clerk, Absent: Meyers and Webster.

Report of the street commissioner to the effect that the estimated cost of the repairs necessary to make the McGee hill safe for travel would be about \$1,000, and that in his opinion the work could be done cheaper by the village itself—that they could get the Patterson cement machine, with a man to run it, for \$100 a day. "The Farm-

ing on Lumber & Coal Co. will furnish cement, and plenty of labor was obtainable at 35 cents per hour.

It was proposed to erect cement retainers 2 1/2 feet at the bottom and 10 inches at the top, to be 18 inches above the roadway, with an iron railing on top, the roadway to be 24 feet wide for a distance of 120 feet each side of the bridge.

Charles H. Ely will furnish gravel and a quantity of old "grate" iron could be obtained of the D. U. K. at the Junction power house for reinforcement.

The report stated that the McGee estate was in favor of the improvement, as were all others interested.

Motion was made by Trustee Nichols and supported by Trustee Ely, that the street commissioner go ahead with the job according to his report, which motion was carried unanimously.

On motion the Council adjourned. W. F. Lusk, Village Clerk.
