NEW LAW BENEFITS OWNERS OF SHEEP

Act Becoming Effective on August 1 Gives Better Protection From Dogs.

LICENSE FEE IS INCREASED

Tags Now Will Cost Two Dollars a Year for Male Animals and Five Dollars for Females—All Must Pay.

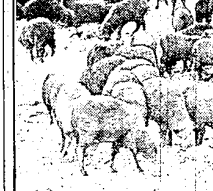

East Lansing, Mich.—Michigan sheepmen have been many years in winning their fight for the protection of their flocks from dogs, but victory at last is on the way and should arrive by August 1. It will be upon this date that Michigan's new law regarding some value will find it worth while to have it owned. After August 1 every owner of a male dog in the village and township throughout the state will be required to buy a \$2 tag, while every owner of a female will be compelled to pay \$5. These tags will be purchasable from the township or village clerk. The fees, it will be noticed, are higher than they were under the old law, which placed them at \$1 and \$3 for males and females respectively.

Another good thing about the act is that it permits sheriffs, deputies, constables and police to kill without any tag any dog found at large in violation of provisions of the law, and for performing the service the officers will be entitled to the same compensation they receive for executing a warrant in criminal cases.

Provision is made also for collecting damages from the village or township for losses which may have been caused by dogs attacking flocks, though as in the case of the old act, satisfactory proof will have to be presented to the proper authorities.

But to be of maximum benefit, the law is wise, it won't leave the enforcement to the owners of sheep alone. Many there are who believe that instead of the complaints from raisers of

lating the ownership and custody of dogs will become effective and it should be a happy occasion for the raisers of mutton and wool. But in their elation flock owners should not forget that it they wish to have the full benefit of the new legislation they will have to take up themselves to see that the law is enforced. Experience has taught that the measure certainly will never enforce itself.

There are perhaps but few sheepmen in the state who haven't heard of the new law, but on the other hand, few are aware of its provisions. Inquiries about it have been frequent. To these gentlemen after information, this answer may be made: The act is still a long way from being perfect, but if sheepmen will make the most of it, they may be much better protected than they have been heretofore.

Individuals in quest of all details can of course procure a copy of the act from the secretary of state, but its main provisions are simple and relatively few in number.

The act is aimed principally at discouraging the keeping of useless dogs by making the license fee so high that only a man who possesses an animal

sheep are nothing more than wild things, but the truth of the matter is that there probably isn't any other single factor which has stood so much in the way of building up the sheep industry as the lack heretofore of protection from dogs. Dr. H. H. Halliday of the state livestock sanitary commission is authority for the statement that direct losses caused in flocks by attacks from dogs range from \$150,000 to \$200,000 a year in Michigan alone.

But this damage—the evident damage—probably does not compare in amount with the harm suffered by the sheep left alive.

A letter typical of many we receive says this: "The township has paid me for the sheep and lambs killed by dogs, but that, really, is only a small part of the damage. The rest of my flock is so nervous that neither the mothers nor the lambs are thriving as they should. The township doesn't pay me for that loss."

The public will do well to appreciate, therefore, that if it ever hopes to get more than a few, and cheaper mutton, it must do its share in seeing that the dog law is enforced.

WHEAT NEEDS GOOD SEED BED Preparation Now for Fall Planting Is Necessary for Best Results.

East Lansing, Mich.—The watchword of the hour, "Prepares" applies to wheat as fittingly as to war. Upon the manner in which this admonition is heeded will depend in large measure the size of Michigan's 1918 crop of this grain. Preparation for it must be thorough, and it must be early.

This, perhaps, is something of which most Michigan agriculturists are well aware, but mention of it again can do no harm.

To provide good soil conditions for fall wheat, the upper three inches of the seed bed should be in good tilth, that is, fine and mellow, while the surface of the soil should be well compacted with a good connection established between the subsoil and the surface. Early preparation is best, especially in dry seasons, to obtain these results. Plowing about seven inches deep is desirable unless the soil is shallow, in which case too much subsoil should not be brought to the surface at one plowing. If it is desired to deepen the soil, it should be done gradually. The use of a roller is desirable to press the furrow into the subsoil. Disking before plowing may also tend to prevent the formation of a lumpy seed bed if the soil is somewhat dry. Fields should be harrowed often to fine the soil and kill weeds. Late plowing usually does not allow sufficient time to prepare a desirable seed bed for wheat.

Large yields of fall wheat are often secured in communities where it is possible to sow wheat after a cultivated crop, because contention cutting throughout the summer prepared an ideal seed bed for this crop; and

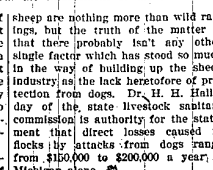

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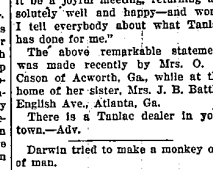
