

New Scientist Community To Be Built At Milford

Twenty-three acres of partially-wooded land near Milford will be the location of a proposed new residence and retirement community for members of any Church of Christ, Scientist.

The land is owned by the Greater View Foundation, a non-profit Michigan corporation, and preparations for the first unit have started.

Christian Scientists of any age will be eligible to live in the community, and provisions are being made to give financial assistance to those who qualify in other ways.

THE FIRST UNIT, to be built at an estimated cost of \$950,000, include plans to house a maximum of 60 residents in single rooms and two-room units.

Future units will include both single and multiple dwellings. The architects are O'Neil, Herrett and Luchebach, Inc., of Birmingham.

Residents will provide some of their own furnishings, telephone, and housekeeping. The foundation will provide parking space, recreation facilities, organized activities for individuals and groups, basic furniture, a hobby room, beauty shop, and areas for entertaining guests; as well as light, heat, air conditioning, and three meals a day.

As optional equipment in living quarters, residents may have a Pullman style kitchenette.

Get Acquainted Program Planned Again This Year

A successful experiment in understanding will be given a repeat performance this summer when the second "Operation Get Acquainted" brings more inter church children for short stays in middle-class homes.

The program, in which a number of Observers families participated last year, is sponsored by the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service. Mrs. Kathleen R. Butler, Wayne County home economist, is in charge.

The 1968 "Operation Get Acquainted" placed 104 children in middle-class homes for visits of a week to 10 days.

INVOLVED in the program were 59 Negro youngsters, four east Indians, five Spanish-Americans and six other white children. Their ages ranged from eight to 13.

One Negro and one Oriental family were included among the hosts. The rest were white.

More than 60 per cent of the families that became acquainted with a youngster kept up the contact after the first visit. There were Halloween parties,

Start New Groups To Vitalize Religion

An 18-month special project for individual spiritual and social development for small groups of Catholic people will commence soon in the Farmington-Southfield area, according to the Rev. Pascal O'Hagen, vicar of the district.

Grander View Foundation was incorporated in 1961, under a Michigan charter. The present Board of Trustees includes Robert H. Peirson Jr., of Farmington.

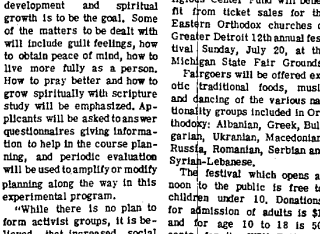
Foundation plans call for ground breaking in the spring of 1970. Site work and construction will take about a year, although the driveway into the grounds may be built during 1969.

A blend of personality development and spiritual growth is to be the goal. Some of the matters to be dealt with will include guilt feelings, how to obtain peace of mind, how to live more fully as a person. How to pray better and how to grow spiritually with scripture study will be emphasized. Applicants will be asked to answer questionnaires giving information to help in the course planning, and periodic evaluation will be used to amplify or modify planning along the way in this experimental program.

"While there is no plan to form activist groups, it is believed that increased social awareness will lead to constructive action among people who are enabled to fulfill their own needs both social and spiritual," the priest stated.

Fr. O'Hagen said of the program: "We feel privileged to have been selected for development of this experimental program for adults. Fr. Fournier comes here after three years at Precious Blood parish in Detroit and some service at Visitation just off the 12th Street riot area. In addition, his training in the Crusade movement and current studies in eschatology at University of Windsor will be of a great deal of help in efforts to develop Christians with whole-hearted dedication to Christ."

Eschatology is defined as the study of the final state of the world, what is expected in the perfection of the universe, what goals mankind is moving toward.

District Nazarenes Will Meet

The church of the Nazarene Eastern Michigan district will hold its annual assembly of the Eastern Michigan district to be held in First Nazarene church in Pontiac on Wednesday and Thursday, July 16-17.

Religion Update

James Forman's Black Manifesto demands that churches and synagogues pay \$500 million in reparations to blacks in preparation for more than \$20 per cent of the American people, according to the Gallup Poll.

Many of these people are black, and some of them are black leaders. The civil rights proponent Edward Ruffin, who has vigorously objected to the black militants' tactic of disrupting church services and occupying drug rehabilitation quarters, has also called the reparations demand "bustling."

The Rev. Thomas Kilgore, first black to be history head of the American Baptists, has served notice that if his denomination's headquarters in Valley Forge are forcibly occupied, the intruders will be forcibly ejected. And Mayor Charles Evers of Fayette, Miss., brother of slain NAACP leader Medgar Evers and the state's first black mayor since Reconstruction added: "If any black or white disrupted our church services, he'd go out on his head."

IN MANHATTAN, however, the national headquarters of the United Church of Christ, on the 16th floor of the Interchurch Center of Riverside Drive, are at this writing being occupied by black militants. (Previously smiling denominational staffers in other floors of the building refer to it as being "liberated.")

This writer saw two of these militants turn away an anxious missionary who pleaded that he had to contact his denominational leaders. But these "leaders" were nowhere to be found.

The militants explained that they had been occupying the building for the past three days and that they intended to stay and to use telephones and mimeograph until the leaders delivered some assurance of meeting a demand for \$140 million.
