Another Pioneer Gone.

Mrs. Angeline Lapham, aged 85 years, who had spent nearly her entire lifetime in this town-ship and Detroit, died at her home on Warren avenue, De-troit last Monday, after an illness of only a couple of days, although she had been an invalid practi-cally all her life.

Her husband, Abram-Lapham, died in Detroit some 28 years ago after moving to the city from what is now the F. M. Warner farm. She is the last immediate representative of the two fami lies, and was a woman of high character of a loveable disposition and admired by all who came in

contact with her. The funeral services were held from the late home, Rev. W. A Moore, of the Church of Our Fa-ther, officiating, and the remains laid to rest in the Quaker ceme-tary, this village, the great nenhews of the deceased lady act ing as pall bearers.
