Picketing agents have been asking their customers to support them by withholding premium payments. They maintain that insurance contracts cannot be lapsed for non-payment of premiums during a strike.

A John Hancock spokesman in Boston told The Observer that the district office at 28000 Five Mile Road, Redford is open daily for receipt of premiums. He said that the company is required by contract to terminate policies of customers who miss premium payments.
