The first group to meet in the recently acquired Farmington Community Center was the newly-organized Farmington Citizens Association (FCA), whose stated purpose is: "to preserve and improve Farmington's residential community while protecting against planning or zoning which would detract from a residential environment."
The group at present is comprised of residents from Woodcroft, Alta Loma, Warner Farms and Farmington Oaks subdivisions. The next meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. July 23 in the community center.

ORGANIZED AS A non-political, non-partisan and non-commercial body, the FCA adopted as its initial objectives: to oppose any further multi-family or apartment developments within the City of Farmington; to stop any further encroachment of business developments on residential areas; to stop spot rezoning which will be harmful to adjacent property owners and/or the community as a whole; to demand enforcement of city health, safety and building ordinances, particularly green belts and other restrictions on commercial and multi-family projects already in existence; to foster planning improvement and beautification in existing business areas and to resist development of new business ventures which will detract from the community.
