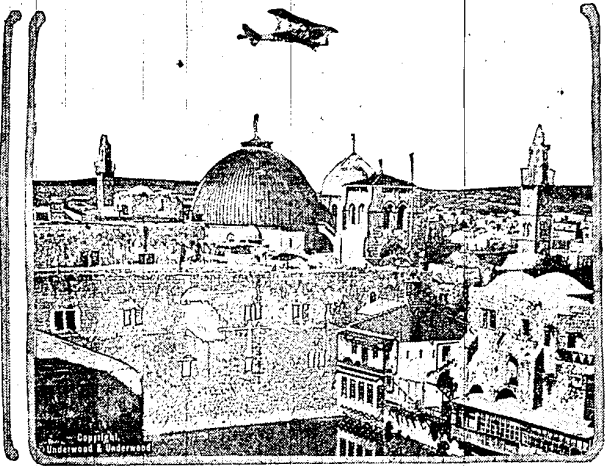
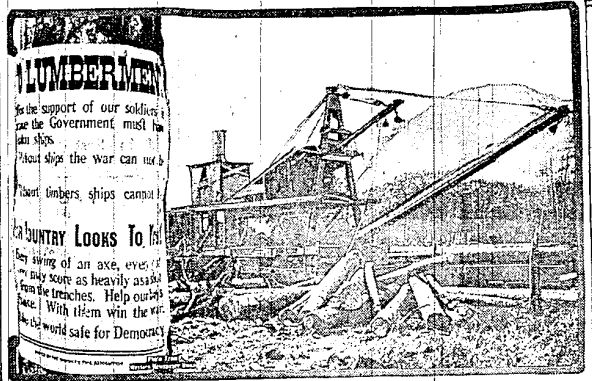


JERUSALEM, THE HOLY CITY, TAKEN BY THE BRITISH

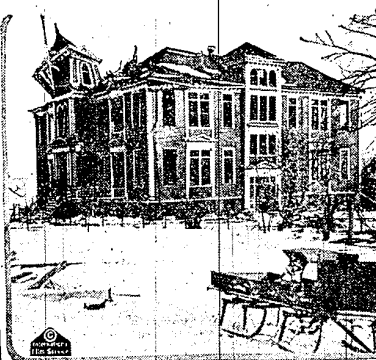
Wait Over Night.
