Another Pioneer Dies

William H. Coe, an aged and respected citizen of West Bloomfield township, died at his home on Monday afternoon from the effects of a stroke of paralysis.

The deceased was born on the old Edwin Coe farm on section 31, over 72 years ago, and has resided on that farm nearly ever since. He was a carpenter by trade, having applied himself to that vocation for over 40 years.

He was united in marriage to

Dora L. Tanner, of Ionia in 1867, they having celebrated their golden wedding last July.

Besides the widow he leaves the following children to mourn him: Fred, of Clare county, Eugene, of Commerce township; Estella, wife of David Purvis, of Windsor, Ont.; Eva, wife of Fred Parmenter, of Walled Lake; Retta, wife of Alex.
