To Our Customers and Friends----

The United States Food Administration has ruled that all flour mills shall be operated under license and regulations promulgated by them. Mills not conforming thereto shall have their licenses revoked, and be subjected to fine or imprisonment or both. Ruling effective is: That "No licensed mill shall use more than 364 bs. of cleaned, 58-lb, or heavier wheat in insking (196 lbs.) one barrel of flour," also further ruled, "That all contracts made previous to December 25th, for flour, of different grades than above specified shall be cancelled and reinstated on a basis of the new grade."

"No miller manufacturing wheat of rye flour, or

"No miller manufacturing wheat or rye flour, or dealing in wheat or rye flour, shall sell or deliver any such flour to any person knowing that such sale or delivery will give such a person a supply thereof in excess of his reasonable requirements for use or sale by him during the period of 30 days next succeeding the delivery thereof.

As the rulings specify that no wheat flour shall be sold to any customer, unless said customer purchase a like proportion of wheat flour substitute—Buckwheat, Corn Meal Bran or Midlings. We have been compelled

in wheat flour, but will continue to sell Bran, Buck-wheat, Corn Meal and Midlings as before.

Custom Grinding

will be continued with farmers on exchange basis without insisting on farmers taking substitute commodities, but we urge farmers as a patriotic duty to cooperate in flour conversation by using substitutes for wheat flour at all times.
