**ANN ARBOR**  
It might be long and wordy, but it's Shaw.  
The "M" is a production of "Doctor's Dilemma" now playing on at the University of Michigan campus.

Don't mistake—that Irishman takes his usual poses at society and morality of his day, but his primary target this time is doctor's.

Mix in incurable tubercular disease (which one of the doctors is supposed to be able to cure) and you have the play. Shaw's hitch is the fact that the artist (whom all agree is talented and accomplished) is a cat who is judged by contemporary standards. Thus the

doctor won't save him. Much has been written about the dilemma of the modern day doctor in choosing the patients for the few kidney machines.

Shaw put his barbed pen to work on the problem in 1911. No answer is provided, but Shaw wasn't concerned with solving the problems of society.

SO MUCH for the basic ingredient—the play. What about the production?  
Technically it was well done. The best about the production were the sets.

The staging could have been improved upon. Director Haines went from the extreme of actors pacing across the stage to no movement.

It was almost fatal to a production that ran almost three hours. Shaw is an accomplished writer, but his plays can almost always be trimmed without doing great damage to the theatrical impact.

THE ACTORS were all masterful, but there were times when the long speeches detracted from the play. You could sense the audience losing its grasp of the play and even the actors seem to lose touch at times.

Marilyn Shelton deserves an accolade for her performance as Jennifer. The role had as many inherent problems as the others, but her struggle to master the character was less visible.

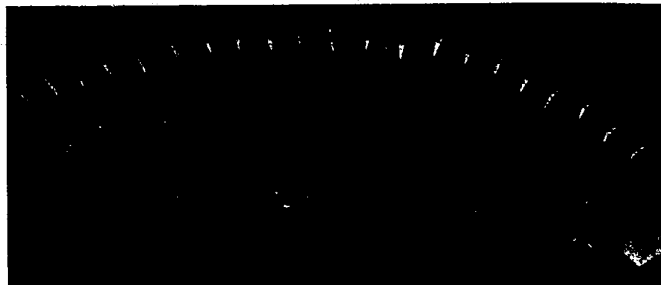
Best supporting role honors go to Mary Joan Negro for her performance of Emily—an old-time servant who really runs the household.
