## NOTICE

Notice of hearing of objections to proposed improvement under Act 59, Public Act of 1915, as amended, of assessment district read No. 225.

To all persons interested in said proposed improvement, and to the Township of Farmington and the Village of Farmington, Oakland County, and to the County of Oakland:

WHEREAS, A petition has been filed with the State Highway Commissioner of Michigan, praying for the improvement of the Highway, commencing at the intersection of the Grand River Road, as called, with the Base Line Road, so called, said point lying also on the south line of Section 36, Town 1 north, Range 2 east, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, and on the dividing line between Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan; thence continuing northerly along the present traveling highway known as the Grand River Road through sections 36, 35 and 26 of said Farmington township to the easterly boundary line of the Village of Farmington; thence continuing northerly along the present traveling highway, known as the Grand River Road, to the northwest corner of Section 25 of said Farmington township, a distance of 4 1/2 miles, more or less;

WHEREAS, It is the opinion of the proposed improvement is necessary for the benefit of the public and would be for the convenience and benefit of the public welfare; and

WHEREAS, I, as such Commissioner, am of the opinion that the proposed improvement is necessary for the benefit of the public and would be for the convenience and benefit of the public welfare; and

WHEREAS, I have determined the boundaries of the proposed assessment district for improving said highway in the Village of Farmington and Farmington Township, Oakland County, as above described;

WHEREAS, It is proposed to improve said road or highway by construction thereof a Class F, cement concrete road, 16 feet in width, excepting in the Village of Farmington, which shall be improved as follows: Station 165 to 168, cement concrete pavement 30 feet in width; Station 168 to 173, cement concrete pavement 50 feet in width; Station 173 to 176, cement concrete pavement 40 feet in width; Station 176 to 179, cement concrete pavement 30 feet in width, together with the proper culverts, bridges, drainage and grading under the provisions of an act, entitled "An Act to Provide for the Construction, improvement and maintenance of Highways, for the levying, spreading and collecting of taxes and of special assessments therefor, to authorize the borrowing of money and the issuance of bonds under certain restrictions, regulations and limitations, to prescribe the powers and duties of certain officers, with reference thereto, and to validate certain proceedings heretofore taken," Act 29, Public Act of 1915, as amended.
