### OUR NEW SYSTEM

Owing to the government order that no publisher shall send a paper after expiration, unless reviewed within three months the Enterprise, on October 1st, will inaugurate a strictly "pay-in-advance" system, and every name whose subscription is not paid ahead at that time will be dropped.

We do not wish to be misunderstood or arbitrary in the matter, but the new rule is not of our making, but is demanded of every publisher by the postoffice department of the government. We are mailing notices to every subscriber whose subscription is not paid ahead, giving the amount due, and the amount of a year in advance.

This new departure is not because we do not trust you, or doubt your honesty, but because the government says we must change our system, not only in the matter of subscriptions, but in a number of other ways. We cannot send papers to the boys overseas, exchange with other papers or "give" any papers away. They have also raised the mailing rate, and compelled us to pay a revenue on the advertising revenue in each issue.

We hope these new regulations will in no way inconvenience any of our readers and friends, and we ask that you aid us in living strictly within them. By so doing we shall be able to continue to give you a good home paper. Otherwise we might have to hang out a sign—"Out of Business."

And when the new system is fully established, we guarantee not one of our subscribers would wish to have us go back to the old plan.

### MANGUM NAMED AS HARMONIZER

Chicago—Organized efforts to harmonize the activities of the Republican party in the fall congressional elections will be in charge of John D. Mangum, chairman of the Republican state committee of Michigan.

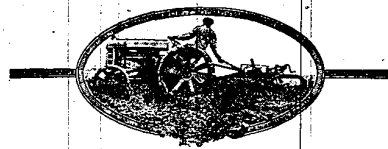

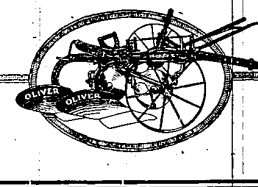
