Disagrees With Editorial Stand

In the form of rebuttal to your editorial appearing on July 27 regarding the Farmington City Council action on rezoning of the Jackson property, I wish to advise your readers of the facts.

The Jackson property is not stranded among commercial and industrial property as stated in the article but rather two sides of the same coin. The residences of Farmington Oaks. Only the north boundary abuts multi-family zoning. Commercial zoning is where near his property. Speaks On Hair

If Mrs. Pat Smith disputes the compliance that rules at North Farmington High School are enforced discriminatorily then she is woefully uninformed. All she has to do is ask Mr. Graham, North Farmington High School principal, and he will readily admit that this is the case.

I was a member of the parent committee in March and attended a meeting with other parents, school staff and students involved in the walkout. I asked to see the disputed rules sheet and after about 45 minutes one was provided. There was no date on the sheet and the students said they had not seen it that year.

I asked for a copy for each person attending but was told there was only one copy so we passed it around the table. One rule was that hair on boys could not be below the shirt collar. The next rule was that no beards would be allowed. I pointed out that this list of rules was being enforced discriminatorily by the administration because I had personally seen about one hundred North Farmington boys with hair to their shoulders. These boys were being allowed to remain in school while one boy who had broken the next rule on the list was forced out of school.

If you completely ignore one rule and enforce the next to the point of forcing a young man out of school (who wishes to be in school) then how can you deny rule discrimination?
