High School Boys and Parents

The U. S. Boys' Working Reserve is an organization that is endeavoring to mobilize the high school youth of this Nation for productive work in this time of national crisis, chiefly upon the farms. Already the farms of the country have been denuded of fifty per cent of their hitherto available farm hands. They are about to be further denuded. It is positively certain that the farmers cannot harvest their crops without the help of the members of the U. S. Boys' Working Reserve.

We are therefore appealing to the schools, to the boys, and to their parents to answer the Government's call and to permit the boys to go to the farms, in order that the harvests of the country may be garnered and saved, and to feed our civilian population and our fighting men in France.

This release is thoroughly feasible if the schools will awake, as many of them have awakened, to the necessity and will accommodate their organization to it.

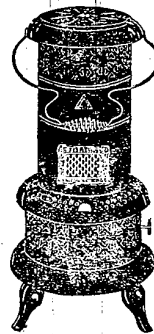
