TO OUR PATRONS:

The check we forward you today is for November milk delivered us, price on same the highest of any month since we have been in business (27 years), but none too much under existing conditions. This month (December), the Milk Commission made a price of \$3.82, delivered in the First Freight Zone, for 3.5 per cent milk. This price is higher than other months, and should be an incentive to all of us to feed and care for our herd of cows well.

We appreciate the patronage of all our patrons, some of whom have delivered us their milk for nearly a quarter of a century, and therefore will increase the price for December milk to all to \$4.01 per 100 pounds delivered, irrespective of test, the 1 cent to go to the Producers' State Association. If this is not entirely satisfactory, let us know at once and we will figure your milk on the test plan for December, at commission's price. We desire all our patrons to remember that each month during 1919 we will pay the Highest Price prevailing and possible in this section, and grant every accommodation we can at any time, to any or all of our patrons.

The following list are the prize winners in our production contest (twenty-five prizes in all) for Liberty Bond and War Savings Stamps. The per cent following each name is the percentage of total milk delivered during September, October and November, as compared with April, May and June. This shows that the high man delivered 254 pounds in fall to 100 in spring, and low man delivered 90 pounds in fall to 100 pounds in spring, while the average of all our patrons was only 60 pounds in the fall, as compared with 100 pounds in spring:
