Photographer brings real world in view

There is a whole world out there few of us ever see. So photographer Geoff Winningham decided to show it to us.

"Geoff's social documentary photography does what the medium can do best," Tom Halsted, owner of the 631 Gallery of Birmingham, said.

"It can record that which is real, but which is the kind of thing we don't come in contact with that much," he said. Winningham's work is currently on exhibit at the gallery.

If you think you've seen everything, guess again, it just isn't so, suggests Winningham's work. The 631 show is a compendium of work from two of Winningham's portfolios — "Friday Night at the Coliseum" and "Going Texan: The Days of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo," plus others.

THE EXAMPLES shown can be taken on two levels. If you're a wrestling freak, it's possible the Coliseum photographs are going to look familiar. If you're not a fan of wrestling, the studies of people who are is fascinating.

The livestock and rodeo studies are particularly appealing because they depict things not shown even on television.

Winningham's work has a very existential quality. There is nothing cosmic about it. It requires something of the viewer. Look at one of the photographs. "Oh, it's just a wrestler," you say.

But look ground, someone is making a face, the referee is working in the background, a fan is taking a picture of her favorite performer.

Winningham leaves nothing to the imagination. He photographs every available aspect of the situation in which he finds himself — and being there obviously is not by chance.

FROM HIS BOOK "Friday Night at the Coliseum" one gets a lasting impression of the crowd, the officials, the performers to create an unmistakable aura that can't have changed much

from the time of the first coliseum episodes.

"Going Texan . . ." looks like something that would be difficult for the average Yankee. For one thing, you'd have to get a whole new wardrobe of "western cut suits" and hats, to be sure.

Then, you'd have to know a little something about agriculture and livestock, not to mention country and western music. Otherwise you wouldn't know about Hank Snow or Sonny James, or a thing called a "tutulated steer."

But after you see Winningham's work, you are certain to have more of a feel for what he's seen. His chronicles are complete, although devoid of committed emotion. However without commitment to the situation emotionally, he is apparently able to trim through the never to show us the base mettle of his characters.

Halsted said he wonders whether Winningham's work appeals to the collector.

"People look at it and say 'But would I like that hanging on my wall?' All art isn't beautiful, some is just stimulating like this work," Halsted said.
