This month, Channel 56 has "Oldies but Goodies" scheduled for the Saturday night movie series "Film Festival 76." Film Festival '76 presents two Alec Guinness movies back-to-back the following Saturday at 9 p.m. "Last Holiday" (1950), is the subtle, witty story of a lonely salesman who takes a final fling when told he has a fatal and incurable disease. In "To Paris With Love" (1955), savoire-faire and the spirit of romantic adventure take a widower and his son to Paris to "chercher les femmes." "A Sense of Loss" (July 24, 9 p.m.) is a not so old (1972) but definitely different film. It's the story of the Irish Civil War told in the human terms of, suffering and loss of loved ones caused by terrorism and bombing. The film features interviews with Bernadette Devlin, Rev. Ian Paisley, a British commander and an IRA Provisional leader. Double-dip comedy is the topping on this month's movie schedule (July 31, 9 p.m.) starting with the French film "Cesar and Rosalie" (1972).
