Tips to protect from too much sun

Just being out in the sun—walking, playing or working—counts as exposure. It's not necessary to be actively sunbathing to run into trouble with the sun's rays and its aging effect on the skin.

Beauty experts offer the following suggestions to help protect your skin from the cumulative effects of the sun:

- Tan gradually. Use effective sun-screening preparations. Re-apply often and always after a swim.
- Plan your tan. Use your own judgment. Fifteen minutes a day for the first five days is a recommended suggestion.
- To get an even tan, wear your briefest bathing suit for the first few days. Slather your sun cream over every exposed inch.
- Cover your hair, especially if colored or bleached, to avoid sun-drying or fading.

• Don't let your eyes go naked in the sun. Delicate skin around the eyes is especially vulnerable. Eye shadow and mascara offer some protection.

• Wear sunglasses for protection and also to avoid formation of squint and strain lines.

• Quench thirst lips with a moisturizing preparation. Re-apply often and always after a swim.

• Avoid sunning in the hottest part of the day. Take a noon hour rest or an early afternoon siesta.

• Wear white with caution. While it reflects heat rays and makes you feel cool, it still lets ultra-violet rays through, especially when wet.



'Bauief J'Ansembourg' called interesting dish

If I were to dream of a place to spend the rest of my life, I think it would be Luxembourg with its old castles, ancient statues and a knowledge of haute cuisine which I will never forget.

The streets are lined with cafes and patisseries that are hard to walk by without stopping.

This week I stayed at Ansembourg Castle, which is a legend in itself, stemming back to the 18th century. I was greeted by the Count, the Countess, and met a few of the people who work for them, one of whom is Charles, an American from In-

diana who came to the castle a year ago to work in the castle gardens.

Everything served in the castle comes from the castle gardens, from the fresh vegetables to the wine. It is truly the way we should all eat, but it was different for me, being served, instead of serving.

THE FIRST RECIPE I found that is quite interesting is a roast of beef au burgundy, but I shall call it Roast Bauief J'Ansembourg.

Here it is: Choose a lean roast, about four or five pounds and cover it with fresh cracked pepper, and salt. Place in roasting pan with a garnish of vegetables and about one cup of burgundy wine. Roast at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes while basting every seven minutes.

Slice the roast against the grain to assure tenderness.

Remove the natural juice from the roasting pan and put it in a fry pan. Bring to a boil, then add eight ounces of butter. When butter melts, place one fresh egg in the juice for every serving and baste for at least two minutes.

Then place each egg on a slice of beef, covered with the natural juice.

A nice accompaniment would be water-cress with a mixture of burgundy, vinegar and oil.

To top it off, serve with a small glass of quench, known here as "Luxembourg Light n'ing."
