

Garden City Wins 2...Then Bows In Pony Regionals

Salutes are in store for Garden City West's Pony League baseball team.

After winning the state title a week ago, West engineered a pair of victories in the Midwest regionals at St. Clair Shores before finally being ousted from the competition.

"We're proud of these boys," said Manager Scott Wilcox, who directed the West Stars.

"We never have gone this far in national competition and it's a tribute to these boys (13 and 14 years of age) for doing such a magnificent job."

WEST STARTED out in the regional, giving indications the Garden City entry might sweep through the journey.

On opening day, West downed

Rockford, Ill., 5-4.

Then came a 4-1 victory over Downers Grove, another entry from Illinois.

But that's where the West success story ended, in a head-on battle with St. Clair Shores, host team, West was edged out, 5-4.

Elimination came the next day when North Brook, also from Illinois, ousted Garden

City, 6-1.

DAVE SUSEWITZ hit high-lighted West's opening victory over Rockford. He lashed out a homer and two singles, drove in one run and scored another.

Sam Tjalsma hurled most of the way for West, but it took Terry Dobbs' relief effort in the seventh to put out the fire after Rockford scored four times to

pull within a run of a tie in the final stanza.

Garden City also had enjoyed a "big" seventh — scoring three homers in the first half of the frame.

Dobbs was back on the mound in the 4-1 win over Downers Grove.

He received his chief batting support from Jerry Herbst who drove in three runs with a pair

of hits.

Herbst's first belt knocked in Ron Waszczenki, who had doubled. Then Herbst followed with a two-run single.

Dobbs himself tripled and counted on a fielder's choice.

AGAINST ST. CLAIR SHORES, Garden City fell behind by 5-0, before rallying in the seventh

inning.

With Stocmas and Mark Zurekko aboard, Waszczenki singled both in. But then Waszczenki, trying to take second on the throw home, overran the bag and was tagged out.

Four errors didn't help the Garden City cause. Neither did a stiff breeze.

Tjalsma had two hits for the

losers who wound up with seven safeties during the game.

The tourney finale for West, as matters turned out, came against North Brook which jumped into a 3-0 lead by the second inning and then added five more tallies in the seventh to seal the outcome.

Zurekko's double and Dobbs' single produced West's only run.

first five innings and Buckman finished.

Wilson allowed one run and four hits and fanned four. Buckman yielded two hits and fanned three the rest of the way.

Bailey's first hit knocked in Gordon Miller and Denny Kola-kowski in the opening inning.

In the second inning with Wilson aboard, Bailey connected with another hit.

Pat Ferrio drove in Denny Storm in the fourth while in the fifth Storm squeezed in one run and Bailey delivered a sacrifice fly to wrap up the Pirates' scoring.

The winners totaled 11 hits with Primus, Fahey, Holmes, and Smith each collecting a pair. Mt. Pleasant also socked out 11 hits with Bob Reichbauer leading the way with two triples, a double and two singles in six trips to the plate.

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
