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Women Need Iron Rich Food

Females, ages 10 to 55, should eat more iron-rich and iron-fortified foods than many do, according to the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences.

Recent studies show iron deficiencies in a large number of women during these years due to menstrual losses and demands of pregnancy and nursing.

Best sources of iron are red meat, especially liver and heart, egg yolks, and such snacks as dried apricots, peaches, prunes and raisins. Not to be overlooked are greens such as collards, kale, mustard and spinach although these are not as easily absorbed.

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
