Art train scheduled to make a stop

Artrain, the free mobile art exhibit housed in six boxcars, will roll into Orchard Lake Thursday. Numerous activities from art fairs to fashion shows have been planned throughout its stay, which ends Wednesday.

The train will be stationed near the intersection of Orchard Lake and Depot roads near St. Mary's College.

It is the only area visit of Artrain this year and is sponsored by the Orchard Lake Seniors and Historical Society.

Theme of the train, which is scheduled to tour for five years, is "A Celebration of the Creative American Spirit."

Patrons will get a peek at what's in store during a champagne preview at 7 p.m. Friday with the train opening to the public ceremonies at 1 p.m. Saturday.

Hourly entertainment including local musician Steve Westal and Boob the Clown are scheduled throughout the afternoon and evening.

In addition to works by noted American artists of the 19th and 20th centuries, various state and local artists will be demonstrating their skills in one of the boxcars.

Local artists to be exhibiting during the weekend include Catherine Baldwin, oil painter; Charles Gadd, violin maker; and Hiroko Inaminger, potter. From 1 to 3 p.m. Saturday.

Food prices in C'ville are raised

Clareneville School District employees will have to pay five cents more for their school lunches following action last week of the school board.

The increases are to reflect increased costs of labor and food in the district, which includes parts of Livonia, Farmington Hills, and Redford Township.

The new prices, effective immediately, will have most adult lunches priced from 60 cents to 65 cents, or 25 cents higher than the same meal offered to students.

Harold Humble, administrative assistant to the school superintendent, said that schools will continue to offer meals for senior citizens.

Main dishes range from 65 to 80 cents, while sandwiches will cost from 60 to 65 cents.

Salads range from 20 to 75 cents.

On-board Artrain staff of technicians and artists will be answering questions from 5 to 9 p.m. Saturday.

AGAIN SUNDAY, opening ceremonies will be held at 1 p.m. with a full schedule of musical entertainment throughout the day.

Local artists to give demonstrations Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m. include George Dehuck, oil painter; Ray Sobocinski, early American wood-carver; and Jim Webers, potter.

Regular hours for the Artrain will be 11:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. during the weekend and 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 5 to 8 p.m. Monday through Wednesday.

Early morning hours Monday through Wednesday have been reserved for children's hours.

All fourth and fifth graders in the West Bloomfield Schools will have an opportunity to visit Artrain as a school field trip.

Dr. James Morse, assistant superintendent for instruction, said these grades were chosen on the basis that parents would probably take younger children and older students could go on their own.

It is a significant art opportunity for our community," he said.
