Money collected from the sale goes to scholarships and fellowships sponsored by AAUW.

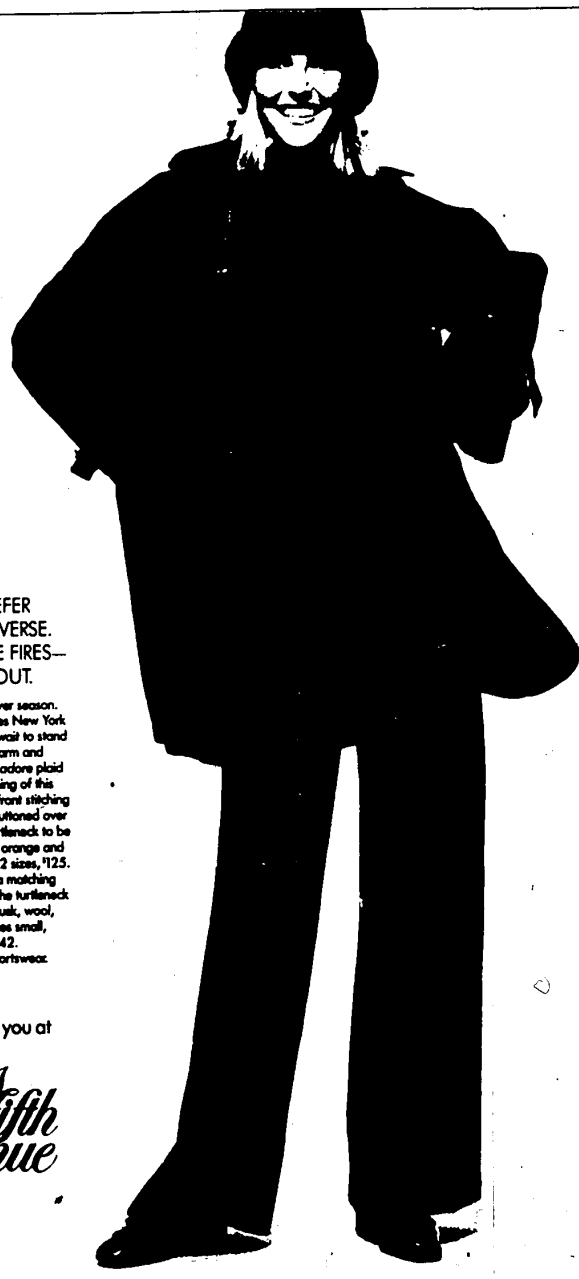
