

# Short 'n' curly look's up top

What's a woman to do with her hair? Well, if she wants to be current and adhere to the fall philosophy of what's in, she'll cut it short, wear it curly and color it with henna.

"The new curly look is being done in shapes and forms that are interesting and still allow the convenience of wash and wear," says Nick Sagrino of Nicholas Intercoiffure in Southfield's Heritage Plaza Building.

Sagrino is a 15-year veteran of the hair styling business which he entered after attaining some prominence as a singer in show business.

"When I started out rollers weren't even being used yet," he said. "It was all pin curls. I came in on the tail end of that phase."

"Now, I believe, the cut and air-drying phase is beginning to fade away to be replaced by rollers and perming, though it won't be the same."

Sagrino thinks that permanent waving is really going to court in the styles of the future. "The wedge is on its way out," he said. "According to friends just back from

Europe, the look shown in France and Italy is short and curly. That's what the trendy set is wearing."

HENNA is the big thing in hair coloring. This will bring into vogue rich browns, reds and golds.

"The whole scale of coloring we have with henna is wider," he said. "You should have no more than 15 per cent grey in your hair to use henna because it will not cover grey. It's a natural process that coats the hair after multiple applications. It cuts the oil in hair and gives it gloss and body."

Sagrino's shop is called Intercoiffure because he is a member of that prestigious group of hair stylists, an international organization of hairdressers in 28 countries including the U.S., Canada and South America.

He said they meet twice a year in New York and focus their deliberations not only on hair but on clothes, shoes and jewelry too.

"Then we have a two day presentation of what's happening with hair," he said. "The amiable stylist is also a past president of America's off-shoot of Inter-

coiffure with about 125 members. For about a year he wrote a column in the shopping news with advice about hair care, styles and other womanly perivars. Sagrino admonished his readers to be sure they came out of the beauty salons looking themselves and not Betty Midler or Ann-Margaret.

"Most important," he wrote, "is shiny, clean, well-shaped hair."

"If YOU ARE handy with your own hair and feel you know exactly how you want it to look, do it yourself. Your hair-style should reflect your lifestyle, your taste and age. Color, cut and condition are all of equal importance."

Sagrino's customers come to him from Grand Rapids, Toledo and Harbor Springs as well as Farmington, Southfield, Birmingham, Troy and Rochester.

"I had one woman who read about me in Florida and on her way across the country, she drove in off the freeway for a haircut."

He sees nothing wrong with a woman bringing in a picture of a hair style she admires as long as "they are used only as a reference."

Klon King of Southfield is the model for the hair style shown here.

"We worked together on a fashion section for the Free Press in New York," he said. "She liked what I did and I liked what she looked like."

The Southfield model posed for all four versions of the short and curly look in one session in Sagrino's shop.
