

Moon is subject of lecture

"Cults and Our Children," a lecture concerning the Rev. Sun Myung Moon and his Unification Church, will be held in the Adas Synagogue on Oct. 15 at 8 p.m.

The lecture is open to the public at no charge, sponsored by the Men's Club and Sisterhood of the synagogue, on Middle Belt Road south of Northwestern Highway. The speaker will be Rabbi Maurice Davis of White Plains, N.Y., who for the past two years has been extremely active in combating the growth of Rev. Moon's cult.

He has founded, and is the president of, Cluam Engaged in Reuniting Families Inc. (CERF), a national organization composed of about 100 families.

In the past year CERF has brought to the public's attention, and to the attention of Congress, the activities of the Moon people and the dangers implicit in the movement. CERF has also been responsible for rehabilitating more than 100 young men and women, and reuniting them with their families.

Rabbi Davis is currently the vice-president of the Westchester Board of Rabbis and co-chairman of the Westchester Task Force.

He is a member of the executive board of the New York Federation of Reform and Synagogues, Zionist Organization of America, the Westchester chapter of United Farm Workers and President's Council of the Council of White Plains. He is editorial columnist for the National Post and Opinion.

Program chairman for the event is Dr. Harvey Nathanson of Farmington Hills. He is assisted by Mrs. Robert Dunkley of Birmingham, Julius Warner of Farmington Hills, Mrs. Robert Katsube and Mrs. Fred Bendorff, both of Grosse Pointe, and Ralph Worswold of West Bloomfield.

President of the men's club is Dr. Harry Markovitz, and president of the Sisterhood is Mrs. Daniel Knipper, both of West Bloomfield.

Northminster art and craft show coming

Take one unusual church building, add artists invited from throughout Michigan and their work, create a medieval setting with colorful banners and strolling musicians, and you have the fourth annual art and craft show of Northminster Presbyterian Church, Troy, beginning Friday, Oct. 22.

The Yamazaki-designed church, with its domed roof and graceful arched windows, will become a series of galleries. The busy Marketplace, Guild Hall and the Artisan's Gallery will be filled with the art works of various artists and craftspeople and the entire Gallery will be hung with fine paintings.

The show will have such touches as costume hostesses to answer questions and

act as guides, an artists' lunch featuring "Pumpkin Brew," and the "Load 'N' Round," which offers shoppers homemade bread, baked by church members, cheese, coffee and mulled cider.

Some of the favorite artists from past shows will be seen again—Bill Nagegast and Pat McKean with their pottery, Linda and Jerry Aydtoll and their jewelry, Ron Scarborough with his pen and ink drawings, and Vince Pernicano with his stained glass.

In addition, many new artists have been added. Mary Ann Zotto-Bella is bringing her hangings created by combining macramé, crochet, wrappings and pottery, and Dee Duxbury will be there with her soft sculpture people and things. Paul Drouin will demonstrate his technique of carving

a scene in beerware, which is then cast in porcelain and back-lighted, making a delicate and beautiful shadow box.

Creating his delightful caricature portraits on the spot will be Bill Starr.

The preview showing 7:30-9 p.m. Friday offers an opportunity to talk with the artists and to attend a concert of Medieval and Renaissance music at 8:30 p.m. An hors d'oeuvre table, laden with good things made by church members, will be open all evening. Friday tickets are \$1.

The main show is 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 22, with an admission price of 50 cents for adults and 25 for children.

Moral perspectives

Voting benefits the voter most

Simple tests of sanity can awaken the most sane of us.

What time is it? A sane person can guess within an hour. What day is it? A sane rhythm of the week gives a feel to a day.

Where are we? A sane person wants to be reachable and knows a location to be contacted. Who is our president? A sane person knows where power is.

Getting ready to vote in November prods us to act sanely. The challenge is in the process of preparing. Issues are not neat and candidates are not superhumans but there are real choices when we understand the problems and options.

DISCOVERING WHAT is at stake in elections awakens us to realize that the more sane we are, the more of reality we will encompass in our awareness. Failing to keep in touch with reality brings disastrous disorganization to the personality. We are lively to the degree we are aware.

Drifting is for rats and immobility is for vegetables. Choosing is for humans because deciding is humanizing. To default is destructive to our sense of self-worth. The process of selecting desired alternatives cultivates our capacity to express our internal spirit.

Freedom we can talk until we die. We seek answers to the big question: Who am I? Part of my sense of self appears in the many mirrors made by the policies I uphold and the leaders I respect. Failing to vote erodes my self identity. Preparing to vote illuminates my view of who I am as a person in society.

MOST CULTURES have viewed leaders as descendants of some god and kings have usually represented divine right. Democracy assumes each citizen embodies an element of divinity so our decisions

taken together are regarded as trustworthy and meriting ultimate respect. Getting ready to vote leads us to our personal knowledge of, and responsibility to, divine will.

Studying issues before voting provokes self-examination which clarifies our values. We build character as we become more appreciative of better ways toward the right, the beautiful, the good, and the true. The major benefit in voting is to the voter.
