## Bnai Brith women honor Esther Allan

Esther Allan, musician and philanthropist, will be the honoree when the Bnai Brith Women's Council of Detroit holds its Fall Gala Luncheon at the Royal Park Inn, No. 4, at the Ko-Saad Country Club, 260 W. Maple, West Bloomfield. The luncheon will climax the special gift campaign conducted by the women's council in cooperation with the Bnai Brith women's councils in the Upper Midwest.

The campaign has raised \$10,000 so far, the raising of \$40,000 for youth services both in United States and in Israel.

Bnai Brith women are the sole support of the Children's Home in Israel, a residential treatment center for emotionally disturbed children. Also funded are the organization's programs on college campuses throughout the United States as well as the Anti-Defamation League and the Anti-Jewish Project in Israel.

Mrs. Allan is the daughter of a renowned tailor, a pianist and composer. A graduate of the London Royal Academ and the Scottish National Academy of Music, she has served as president of the Music Staff Club of Metropolitan Detroit and has directed numerous local and international choirs. She has appeared on national television and is listed in the International Who's Who of Women and the International Who's Who of Women.
