

Navy man in NATO exercise

Navy Cmdr Clifford May, 3508 Glenarden, Farmington Hills, recently took part in "Teamwork 76," a NATO fleet exercise in England.

May is a Naval Reserve and at the time of the exercise was a member of the Investigative Operations Unit 2214 at Naval Air Facility Detroit in Mt. Clemens.

"Teamwork 76" was one of a series of important NATO maritime exercises. It tested plans for the defense of Western Europe and included deployment of reinforcements by sea and the movement of supplies from North America to Europe by high speed convoys.

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Dunkel students favor Ford in conservative school sweep

Dunkel Junior High School students favored the conservative ticket last Friday and voted in Gerald Ford to continue as president.

Students from the seventh to ninth grades at the school awarded 371 votes to Ford and 100 to Carter in the lunch hour mock election.

The second voters rallied to Proposal

A, which would place a mandatory deposit charge on all beverage containers. The proposal passed with 295 votes for and 28 against.

Proposal B, which would lower the age of state representatives and senators to 18, was defeated by the 124 yearend voters at the school. Students voted 483 against the proposal while 236 students approved of the move.

The ballot included the names of third party presidential candidates.

The Human Rights Party and its candidate, baby expert Dr. Benjamin Spock, garnered three votes.

The Socialist Workers' Party was given 18 votes.

The Socialist Labor Party came out with 17 votes.

EUGENE MCARTUHY gained 14 votes in the school.

The U.S. Labor Party and the Libertarian Party shared first in the presidential sweepstakes.

Seven students voted for the U.S. Labor Party and four voted Libertarian.

Patricia Brown, American history teacher, was surprised at the turn out. All the 6th graders in the school also voted.

"I was surprised by the results," she said.

"It was afraid the students would be turned off by the voting."

Students were influenced by Watergate to vote particular promises with scepticism, Miss Brown said.

Students of this age are aware of the Nixon resignation, she reported. "It's important for them to believe the politicians."

Before the election, students read about each issue and are interestedly following up on the different issues. Miss Brown's students helped to encourage interest in the election in other students by holding off-loads over the school's public address system.

Her students also read about each of the presidential candidates.
