

# Scans Attics To Furnish New Center

Clarence Stoll is a one-man collection agency, asking for donations from local attics and cellars.

Stoll began his search the moment he was appointed interim for the Farmington Community Center.

"What we need most," he says, "are some three-way floor lamps and chandeliers for minimal lighting. We also need a filing cabinet and some tables of a suitable size for use as desks or lecterns."

THERE ARE a couple of real treasures remaining in the mansion, according to decorator Stoll. The sideboard in the dining room is American Empire, circa 1820, and the huge oriental rug in the main room was made for the original Ponchartraine Hotel.

He reported that 200 chairs have been ordered to allow organizations to plan meetings in the Center. The executive director will arrive soon and a couple is already in residence to handle maintenance.

Jaycees are completing their paint job on the main rooms and a number of groups are volunteering to refurbish others.

in charge of a volunteer corps to provide various services.

The Stoll residence on Hillcrest is an elegant example of what can be done with ingenuity and eclectic taste. Mr. and Mrs. Stoll moved into an empty shell 20 years ago and together have fashioned one of Farmington's most distinctive houses.

Stoll, who has a degree in architecture, modestly states: "There is no such thing as good taste or bad taste—only individual taste."

He has been retired for three years from his job as a teacher of disturbed children and uses some of his time helping good friends refurbish their antiques or "tasteful junk."

An active member of the Farmington Historical Society, he has done research for the Historical Sites Commission and suggested a list of locations that could be highlights of Farmington's heritage.

He was also influential in forming the Farmington Players and guiding the Friends of the Library.

For the Center, he sees a challenging and promising future "if it can truly become a center of service for the total population of our community."

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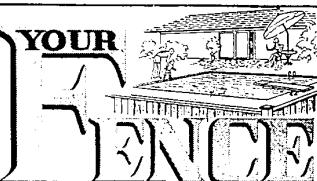
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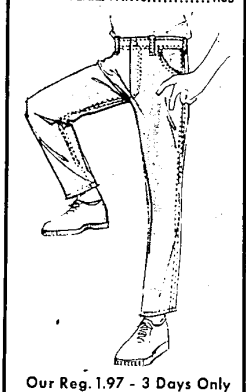
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
