

Name Farmington Women Chairmen OCC Offers Program

In Dental Assisting

Four Farmington women have been named to leadership positions in the Oakland resident campaign of the 1969 Torch Drive.

Appointed a region chairman is Mrs. Edmund J. Ziegler, of 3203 Paddford, whose chairmen include: Mrs. Edward J.

Syperski, 31764 Folkstone; Mrs. Richard G. Goertli, 21515 Waldron, and Mrs. William W. Bowman, 22015 Ridgemoor.

The four will begin immediately, Mrs. Ziegler said, to recruit the many volunteers needed to conduct house-to-house solicitations during the 21st

annual United Foundation campaign.

Scheduled for Oct. 14 through Nov. 6, the drive will seek funds to underwrite operating costs of nearly 200 health and community services in the Oakland, Macomb and Wayne areas.

Mrs. Bowman, a registered nurse and a homemaker, has served as a neighborhood chairman in earlier Torch Drives. Her husband is executive vice president of Thompson-Brown Co. Their four children are Bill, 12; Bob, 11; Blair, 6, and Brenda, 2.

FARMINGTON Farmington area residents have the opportunity of completing a one-year program in Dental Assisting in their own backyard.

Oakland Community College's Highland Lakes Campus in Union Lake offers a certificate for completion of the program. According to Robert Montgomery, D.D.S., assistant professor and chairman of the Allied Health Department, the dental assisting students take a program of dental theory, office skills, human relations, first aid and X-ray technology.

"The students learn all aspects of dental assisting which varies from Girl Friday to chair-side assisting to laboratory work. They also learn dental terminology," he said. In addition to Dr. Montgomery, the program is taught by Mrs. Martin Edson, a registered dental hygienist.

"The second semester the students are offered an opportunity of in-service training for approximately 12 hours a week," Dr. Montgomery added.

He explained that there is a large work market for dental assistants in the area and that it is insufficient for dentists to train their own assistants. "There are over 500 dentists in Oakland County and more than 2,000 in the metropolitan area," he continued.

According to Dr. Montgomery, OCC is the only institution in the county to offer dental assisting.

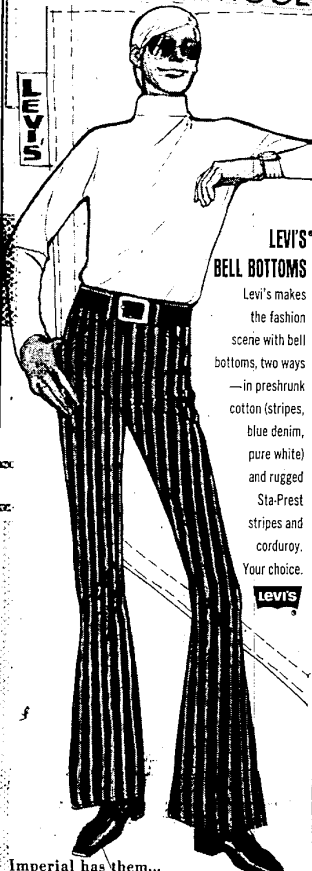
"We have made the program available on a co-op basis for the last three years to seniors at Wallied Lake High School. These students spend two days a week, three hours a day taking introductory dental assisting classes and receive college credit," he said.

OU Offers New Degree

Oakland University will begin a new master's degree program this fall to prepare teachers in special education for emotionally disturbed children.

Students completing the program will receive from OU's School of Education a master of arts in teaching degree. They also will be certified to the Michigan State Department of Education as having met all requirements for certification as special education teachers for emotionally disturbed children.

Long-range objectives for the new program will include the establishment of an interdisciplinary center, to be known as the Oakland University Research and Training Center, to work in the area of the emotionally disturbed.

The center is envisioned as an integral part of a community-wide agency charged with planning for the mental health and education of all exceptional children.

In citing the need for more teachers for emotionally disturbed children, Dean Lasso J. Hetenyi of the OU School of Education noted that a recent survey of the State Board of Education showed that of 67,790 emotionally disturbed children in the state, only 800 were enrolled in public school classes specially designed for them.

The survey showed there were 70 teachers in public school programs for emotionally disturbed and 6,770 were needed, Hetenyi said.

Statistics for the tri-county (Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb) areas revealed that only 520 of the 22,921 children needing special services were being taught in public school programs for the emotionally disturbed.

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
