Festive mood pervades flu clinic

You would have thought they were doing away free parties and beer the way Farmington residents looked to get their same flu shots Monday. The line of people started in the basement, snaked up the stairs and around the parking lot of the American Legion post on Grand River.

The signs, which reserved the space for customers, could have been a little more subtle, for all the good they did.

Sibyl Gaskill, a registered nurse who acted as clinic manager for the center, was delighted pleased with the patient response. "Think it's an omen for some people," she said.

At 3 p.m., 20 minutes after the clinic opened, she suspected that this would not be almost all 2,000 doses of the vaccine with which they started the day. By 3 p.m., Mrs. Ann D. H. later confirmed

The shot injected into the arm by a \$1,000 jet gun is almost painless. The gun looks like a paint sprayer. A nurse pumps the handle of the jet's trigger and with her foot, places the needle against the arm, pulls the trigger and it's done.

The next wave of vaccination clinics in Farmington will be from 12 p.m. to 1 p.m. Nov. 16 at North Farmington High School.
