

BCCE sets schedule

More than 200 courses will be offered by five universities at the Birmingham Center for Continuing Education (BCCE) during the winter term starting in January.

The total is 100 more than were offered during the fall term, which has just ended.

The center, the former Barmen Junior High School, is a cooperative undertaking of the five institutions and the Birmingham Public Schools. Courses include graduate and undergraduate credit and non-credit.

Eastern Michigan University will offer classes for the first time. Oakland University, Wayne State University, Michigan State and the University of Michigan will expand the course selections they scheduled in the fall.

Each university has its own enrollment procedures and students will make application through the individual universities.
