In announcing the new services, Mrs. Franklin Kot, president of Women of Wayne Alumni, said further details and application forms may be obtained through the organization's headquarters at Alumnus House, 441 W. Ferry, Detroit, 48203, or by telephoning Women of Wayne at Wayne State University, 572-2160.

Children may be enrolled at the main campus center from one to five days per week for a minimum of two and a maximum of four hours per day. The center will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Enrollment is limited to 30 children per hour. Charges for the day care service at St. Andrews Church is

75 cents hourly, plus a \$5 quarterly registration fee which includes insurance. Babysitting at the Southfield Center will cost 50 cents hourly.

"The need for this service became apparent to us through our relationship and for part-time students ages 25 through 55," said Mrs. Kot.

"Through our scholarship winners and applicants, we learned that many women could not attend classes because there was no babysitting or other care available for their small children."

"Because women are marrying earlier, having children earlier, and returning to school in large numbers, we feel that the need for this service will continue to grow," Mrs. Kot said. "Eventually, we hope to be able to keep children for longer periods and to enroll younger children."

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Varied Courses At 'YW'

A wide variety of class subjects and programs are being offered this fall at Northwest Branch YWCA at 2910 Grand River. Registration opens Sept. 3 and the fall term begins the week of Sept. 22.

Nursery facilities are available for pre-schoolers on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays for women in the program.

After school hours are devoted to ballet, sewing, ten-dryer classes and guitar for boys and girls under 17.

Evening program is geared for men and women and includes such activities as ballroom dancing, painting, ceramics, bridge, fencing and a variety of special interest classes.

Saturdays schedules include swimming, crafts, fencing, creative dance, gym and ballroom for boys and girls. This program is held at Henry Ford High School from 8:45 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. Registrations are made at the YWCA building.

Subjects offered this fall include: art, astrology, ballet, baby sitting, bowling, basket ball, bridge, ceramics, charm, communications, crafts, dance, de-coupage, dog obedience, driver training, fencing, flower arranging, furniture, gymnastics, knitting, painting, physical fitness, powder puff mechanics, psycho-cybernetics, sewing, self defense, ski school, swimming, tailoring and yoga.

Adult membership in the YWCA is \$5 yearly for men and women; \$2.75 for boys and girls under 17. \$15 for family memberships. To register call the YWCA at KE 7-8500.
