

Sandwiches Celebrated In August

August is filled with valid excuses to serve hearty, in viting sandwiches. No wonder it's celebrated as National Sandwich Month.

For speed when making sandwiches use the assembly-line technique. That is, line up the bread slices, two by two in rows, and top with filling.

Here's when ready-to-serve meats come in handy. Also excellent sandwich makings are slices of leftover roast beef, pork loin, lamb and baked ham. Ground or chopped, cooked or canned meats make great spreads for bread alone or blended with other food and seasonings.

Whether that sandwich meat travels or stays at home, it's sure to satisfy when one of these inviting meat fillings is spread between slices of bread or bun. The following combinations are suggested by Reba Staggs, home economist with the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

DRIED BEEF SANDWICH FILLING

1 jar (2-1/2 ounces) dried beef
1 pkg. (3 ounces) cream cheese
1 l. prepared horseradish
1 T. minced onion
Cut dried beef into smaller pieces with shears. Combine with remaining ingredients, blending thoroughly. Yields 1-1/3 cups filling.

LIVER SAUSAGE SPREAD

1 pkg. (16 ounces) liver sausage
1 l. onion juice
1 l. Worcestershire sauce
1/3 c. salad dressing or mayonnaise
3/4 c. chopped, unpeeled cucumber
Blend together first four ingredients. Lightly stir in cucumber. Yields 2-3/4 cups filling.

HAM AND RAISIN SANDWICH FILLING

1 c. finely chopped cooked ham
2 T. chopped raisins
2 t. chopped nuts
2 t. minced onion
1/4 c. salad dressing or mayonnaise
Combine all ingredients and mix thoroughly. Yields 1-1/2 cups filling.

BACON-PRUNE SANDWICH FILLING

8 slices bacon, cut crosswise in 1/2-inch pieces
1 c. cooked, pitted prunes, finely chopped
2 T. chopped sweet pickles
2 t. prepared mustard
2 T. mayonnaise
Cook bacon until crisp and remove to absorbent paper. Combine with prunes, pickles, mustard and mayonnaise. Chill. Yields 1-1/3 cups filling.

SANDWICH PORK

Barbecued pork on buns is an inspired finale for Sunday's pork roast. No trick to prepare. Just heat strips or cubes of pork in your favorite barbecue sauce.

RIPE OLIVE SALAD ROLLS

3/4 c. canned, pitted ripe olives
1 (7-ounce) can tuna
2 hard cooked eggs
1/2 c. mayonnaise
6 hot dog buns
butter or margarine
Iceberg lettuce
3/4 c. chopped celery
Cut ripe olives into large pieces. Drain tuna and flake.
Peel and dice eggs. Combine olives, tuna and eggs with celery and mayonnaise. Cut rolls in half leaving one side attached and hollow slightly. Spread rolls with butter and keep with filling. Tuck a crisp lettuce leaf inside each roll. Makes six sandwiches.

GRILLED SUPPER SNACKS
For each sandwich:
1 slice bread
prepared mustard
1 slice baked or boiled ham
4 stalks cooked asparagus
1 slice or 1/4 c. grated American cheese
Toast bread on one side. Spread untoasted side with prepared mustard. Top with slice of ham. Arrange asparagus stalks on ham. Cover with cheese. Sprinkle with salt. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) about 10 minutes, or until cheese melts. Garnish with sweet pickles.
