

Yellow Jackets triumph, 63-50

Detroit Country Day outpoints Cranbrook

A Yellow Jacket surge in the fourth quarter lifted its basketball team past Cranbrook, 63-50.
After a slow three quarters, Detroit Country Day got its running game into gear and ran off 10 unanswered points at the beginning of the fourth quarter.
The Yellow Jackets were aided by 15 personal fouls called on Cranbrook in the last half, as they converted on 19 of 21 free throws. Three

players reached double figures for Country Day: they took turns getting hot.
Jeff Johnston, Rodney Gilbert and Courtney Vance rattled off the 10 straight points in a two-minute span to give Country Day a 31-40 lead. The Jackets never relinquished this lead and added 10 straight free throws and a bucket to the cause.
"We've been working hard at free throws all year," said Yellow Jacket coach Tim Donke. "We were quick,

but we didn't play as quick as we should've tonight."
Scoring in double figures for Country Day was Vance with 11, Gilbert was high for Country Day with 14, and Chris Yelder added 10.
"Everybody played a great game," said Donke. "Gilbert played well, and Bruce Zivian played well for coming into a starting role."
Cranbrook opened up a 4-0 lead on baskets by Doug McVey as they held onto a slim 11-10 first quarter lead.

McVey collected six of his eight points in the opening period.
But Country Day kept the game close throughout the first half until Cranbrook hit on three straight buckets to take a 26-20 lead with 1:11 left in the half. Dan Hazen and John Harbeck put in the field goals before Zivian added two points to narrow the gap to 26-22. Hazen then added another two points with five seconds left in the half as Cranbrook led, 28-22.

NEITHER TEAM WAS able to work the ball inside in the first half as both relied on outside shooting and fast-breaking the ball. Cranbrook shot 11 of 31 for 35 per cent in the first half; Country Day hit 10 of 27 for 37 per cent.
The second half saw Country Day come out fighting—they outscored Cranbrook in both periods. Country Day outscored Cranbrook 41-22 in the last half, with 19 of those points com-

ing at the freethrow line.
Cranbrook guard Hazen put them up by eight, 30-22, before Zivian countered with two baskets. After Al Bush, who was the game high scorer with 17 points, added another field goal, the Yellow Jackets scored 11 points to take a 37-32 lead. Country Day made seven of those 11 points at the free throw line behind the shooting of Vance, Gilbert and Zivian.
After that, Cranbrook never got the lead back and trailed by one point at the end of the third quarter, 41-40.
