Old furniture can make miraculous changes

There are so many things you can to to transform your old furniture that it really becomes an embarassment of riches. You can work mirables with upholstered furniture by cutting down the high old-fashioned legs and adding new slip covers or uphol-stery.

You can do almost as much for your old wood furniture with a saw.

Tee-lering, stork-legged tables make any foom seem so full of legs that it looks like it is about to run away legs will be immensely improved if you put the legs down to the height of your sofa and make end tables. You may also have a table that will take well to a cloth down to the floor in a matching fabric to drapery or slip-covers.
