



Redford Man Elected To Head DBC Alumni

Ronald L. Grant, Redford Township resident and Garden City school administrator, was elected recently as president of the Detroit Bible College Alumni Association.

His predecessor, the Rev. Alan Barr, was appointed to the DBC Board of Directors. The changes were announced by Dr. M.C. Patterson, chairman of the board.

Grant, a 1956 graduate of DBC, was elected with The Rev. John Carter, who will be second vice president.

The raising alumni president served on the board as part of his official duties during his three-year term as alumni president.

Affiliated with the Garden City public school system since 1960, Grant currently serves as elementary classroom supervisor and director of the summer session remedial reading groups. He was formerly president of the Garden City Education Association.

In addition to his academic background at DBC, he holds a B.A. degree from the University of Detroit and received his master's degree in education from Eastern Michigan University.

Grant, his wife Margaret, and their two children reside at 11720 Virgil. They are members of Ward Memorial Presbyterian Church, Detroit, where Grant is superintendent of the Junior High department of the Sunday school.

Rev. Barr, new DBC board member, who lives at 23066 Reynolds, Hazel Park, has served as pastor for the West Detroit Baptist Church, Detroit, for over seven years.

Old Hymns Will Get New Mod Treatment

Old hymns of the Christian church have great relevancy in today's most world, believes the Rev. Carl Kallreider, pastor of Antioch Lutheran Church, Farmington.

To point up his belief, he's setting some of the most familiar hymns he knows against the most bizarre and psychedelic background he can dream up.

He'll show the combination at 8 p.m., Tuesday, Aug. 20, as part of the "Something Else" series of services sponsored by his own church, North Farmington Baptist and Orchard Methodist, also of Farmington.

The "psychedelic hymns" will be held in North Farmington Baptist.

The old hymns, without change, is as applicable now as it was 100 years ago when they were written.

"Today's young people understand the background, but they connect it with the words of the popular song-writers. I want to put the old hymn words into it."

PASTOR KALLREIDER did much of the filming for the scheduled hymn-sing, and his daughter, Kitty, 15, and son, Jeff, 10, worked on hand-coloring some of the psychedelic film under the direction of Robert Giles, of the WJ3 television studio.

"The PROGRAM actually is a gimmick of incongruities," the clergyman said, "to show there is no incongruity."

In that respect, it follows the pattern of the Tuesday night services in the "Something Else" series sponsored by the three churches. All have aimed at telling the religious message in various new ways.

The summer series is coming near its close, and Pastor Kallreider said he and the Rev. Ralph Rideout, minister of the North Farmington Baptist, and the Rev. Eric Hammar, Orchard Methodist minister, had agreed it has been successful.

"Congregations ranging from 31 to 149 have been present during the various Tuesday evenings," he said, "and several of the speakers were so interested that they sat around talking long past the time the service was to have ended."

Jewish Studies At UD

The University of Detroit and the Midraша College of Jewish Studies are cooperating in offering a Program of Jewish Studies beginning with the fall semester, credits for which will apply toward a bachelor's degree, according to Father Malcolm Carron, S.J., U. of D. president.

Both Father Carron and Albert Eliazar, president of the Midraша College, expressed extreme gratification at this cooperative agreement between the two schools.

Father Paul Conen, S.J., dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, explained.

"The program's aims are to foster knowledge of Judaism both among Jewish and non-Jewish students as one of the basic influences of Western civilization and to guide both students to a deeper understanding of contemporary western civilization and to guide both students toward unprejudiced mutual understanding."

THE PROGRAM will allow students to take up to 12 credits toward the Bachelor of Hebrew Letters degree.

U. of D. students who wish to work beyond this toward an additional or simultaneous degree from the College in either a bachelor of Hebrew Literature will be able to do so.

Courses will be offered both on U. of D. campus and at the College.

Dr. Shlomo Marefot will be coordinator and adjunct professor for the program. From the College will be Adjunct Associate Professors, Naphtali Wiesner and Benjamin L. Yanko; Adjunct Assistant Professors, Shlomo Berkowitz, Jay Braverman, David Kadosh, Samuel S. Stollman; and Adjunct Instructor, Solomon Schimmel.

FOUR COURSES will be offered in the fall on campus: The Jews and Western Civilization; The Spanish Center to the Industrial Revolution; Sects in Judaism During the Second Commonwealth; A Survey of Jewish Thought; and The Philosophy of Martin Buber and Existentialism. These will be taught by the faculty of the College of Jewish Studies.
