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Join The Unhooked

One million people a year quit smoking. But thousands start. Many of them are teenagers. According to a recent nationwide survey, only about one per cent of 12-year-olds smoke. But by age 17, 35 per cent of the boys and 21 per cent of the girls are regular smokers. Smoking is most common among teenagers whose parents and older siblings have the habit, according to the study.

"Kick the habit and join the unhooked generation!" is the slogan of the anti-smoking campaign of the Tuberculosis and Health Society, and other Christmas Seal associations. But a big slice of the "now" generation gets hooked every year.

One-fourth of all men and one-fifth of all women who have ever smoked have not quit. But it's a lot easier never to start. And some-but not enough--teenagers have gotten the message.
