

Choral Auditions Announced

ANN ARBOR Chorus singers throughout southeastern Michigan may now apply for membership in the University of Michigan Choral Union, which performs in the annual "Messiah" concerts and the May Festival.

Returning members usually make up more than half of the total of 32 members, and they represent more than 30 communities and many church choirs. About 175 vacancies will be filled before the first rehearsal on Sept. 15.

Audition appointments must be made before Sept. 3 at the office of the University Musical Society in Burton Tower. Acceptances will be made before Sept. 10.

Rehearsals will be on Mondays and Wednesdays through the year in Auditorium A of Angell Hall. Donald Bryant begins his tenure as conductor this year, succeeding the late Lester McCoy.

Händel's "Messiah" will be performed Dec. 5, 6, and 7 with guest soloists and the orchestra of the Interlochen Arts Academy.

Preparation for the May Festival choral works, which will be conducted by Eugene Ormandy and Thor Johnson and performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, will begin in January. This year special programs are being planned for smaller units of the Choral Union.

Optional privileges for Choral Union members include academic credit in the University of Michigan, complimentary concert tickets, and special parking.

Cranbrook Sets Four Trips

CRANBROOK Collecting Devonian fossils and witnessing bird and butterfly migration among the scientific treats available to young people who participate in four Saturday field trips conducted by Cranbrook Institute of Science, Bloomfield Hills.

The explorations on Sept. 6, 13, 20 and 27 are open only to student members of the Institute, minimum age of 11. But any young person may join the Institute, become eligible for the trips and also enjoy many other benefits.

The schedule, as arranged by the leader Dr. Phillip T. Clappitt, Institute associate zoologist, is:


Sept. 6 - Arizona, Ont., to collect Devonian fossils, Return by 6 p.m.

Sept. 13 - University of Michigan Botanical Gardens to see living plants from around the world. Return by 1 p.m.

Sept. 20 - Point Pelee National Park for bird and butterfly migration. Return by 5:30 p.m.

Sept. 27 - Stony Creek Metropolitan Park to study glacial geology and ecology. Return by 1 p.m.

Trip-takers must meet at the Environment Study Center (just north of the Institute) by 8:45 a.m. Transportation and a lunch and refreshment for the all-day trips must be provided by parents. Each trip will be made regardless of weather.

Need Director? Spokane Finds Some Answers

DETROIT Representatives of a community theater organization in Spokane, Wash., came to Detroit this week seeking professional help. They found it by contacting members of the American Community Theatre Association (ACTA).

ACTA is one of four main divisions of the American Educational Theatre Association which met in Detroit. More than 1,000 delegates from universities, colleges, high schools, community theater groups and children's theater organizations throughout the country were in attendance.

BRIEFLY The Spokane people wanted to know if a full-time professional director was required to maintain a professional level of competence.

"The paid director would direct the regular season and supervise the studio productions and you could sell your tickets in any of the usual combinations--the regular season, the studio productions or both.

"Don't judge any director simply on the basis of his first season," Stillewicz cautioned. "Give your director at least a two-year contract so that he has an opportunity to meet the people and learn about the likes and dislikes of your audience."

BRYANT listed two basic qualifications to hire and hold a good director.

"First of all the personality of the person is important," Bryant said. "He must like people and like working with your committees and you must like him."

"The second requirement is money," according to Bryant. "With a schedule of 10 plays I don't think that \$10,000 is an adequate salary, but maybe the answer is to work out a base salary arrangement along with a bonus for the director to receive a percentage of the gross box office."

Whether or not the Spokane Civic Theatre hires a professional director is a matter still to be decided by the group's 16-member board of directors.

The Spokane Civic Theatre has just moved into a brand new \$350,000 theater. The group provides the only theatrical productions for the city of more than 170,000 residents.

The last time a professional theater production visited Spokane was five years ago so the theatrical needs must meet the needs of the residents.

When the fund drive for the new theater was launched the group went to the business and civic leaders with the pitch that an active and competent community theater group would help to attract new people and industry to the area.

Last year (the group's first season in their new theater) the quality of the eight shows produced during the regular season was varied.

Betty Towlinson, executive manager of the theater, told the ACTA delegates that "we are now looking to as an example of what good theater is in Spokane and we want to know how the artistic level vary."

"Would a paid, full-time professional director working with our volunteers solve this problem?" she said.

According to the ACTA people the answer is yes.

BRYANT, a past president of ACTA and director of the Sheboygan (Wis.) Community Theatre, said that the post-grad probably be filled with a person with two to three years of experience for "about \$10,000 per year, with less than eight plays to direct."

THE IDEA of directing eight shows during a winter season plus two summer productions scared off most of the director.
