ation had the president's knowledge, encouragement and blessing.

The conspirators were "subjected to physical humiliation," Hunt said, and placed in an "atmosphere of hostility."

"During legal proceedings, I have served more time and paid more money for my part in it than anyone else," he said. "I served in four federal prisons and nine different flea-ridden, roach-filled jails."

Hunt said he and others imprisoned during the Watergate affair were "real victims" and that the media, Congress and Judge John Sirica were "morally wrong" in their handling of the affair.

Hunt, who received \$2,000 from Unicorn Productions, O.U.'s student concert-lecture board, for his appearance, said he has "no sense of reconciliation because I never received one crumb of mercy." Election year doomed his chances of commutation, he said.

HUNT REFERRED to his incarceration and trial as "a travesty. I was interrogated like a menacing Rus-

sian spy by my inquisitors. Too little food, terrible conditions, interrupted sleep—my sensory inputs were restricted, and I became disoriented."

When his wife was killed one month before his trial was to begin, Hunt changed his plea to guilty because he was "devastated," he said. "I hoped for the mercy of the court, but Judge (John) Sirica was not to be denied his headline inquisition."

Hunt blasted Sirica for his "constant demands for the truth. I remember him banging his gavel and saying, 'I want the truth. I don't believe you. I want the truth.' My lengthy sentence was applied to extract the truth."

Hunt said "no one is automatically entitled to the truth, not judges, juries or the general public. What they are entitled to is evidence."

Student reaction to Hunt's talk was primarily skeptical.

"He beat around the bush a lot," said Jay McIntosh, an O.U. junior from Roseville. "He didn't say a lot, really. He just used a lot of adjectives."

Burton Welis, a nonstudent from Detroit, said he attended the Hunt speech "out of curiosity. I wanted to see and hear what he had to say about the real Watergate. He didn't say anything I didn't expect."

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
