'Coiffed hair is back,' says Michel Kazan

Michel Kazan brought his new fantasy hairstyles for spring and summer to his Bonwit Teller salon in Troy and said "coiffed hair is back, wash and wear hair is on the way out."

Coiffure is French for dressed hair and Kazan's use of the word "coiffed" reveals his French couture background. For many years, he designed the hairstyles for the leading French couturiers and says "anything we do in Paris today—tomorrow it is already here."

Today, he dresses the hair of many of the women considered to be fashion pioneers, including Princess Lee Radziwill, Jackie Kennedy Onassis, Gloria Vanderbilt and Babe Paley. "There is nothing uniform (in hairstyles) anymore," Kazan said. "The look is exciting, sexy and feminine."

The Kazan coiffed look is created with a special cushion permanent which Kazan likens to "a woman wearing a crinoline under a dress to give fullness."

"Hair has to be full and with body," he continues, recommending setting with pin curls and special rollers.

MICHEL KAZAN is the only hairdresser who creates a full collection for hair. This season, he has created 12 designs. We selected three to illustrate the fuller look for short, medium and long hair.

"Hair is longer," says the designer "and should

fill in just to the shoulder, to compliment the bare shoulder look."

Recognizing that your short hair won't grow long instantly, Kazan has created the soft, fluffy curled head which will keep you looking soft and pretty until your hair is long enough for one of the more dramatic designs.

His asymmetrical look with all the hair pulled to one side is created to accent the one shoulder design in clothes, but you'll find it a flattering look to wear with everything, particularly when you tuck a flower over one ear.

His tousled, flower strewn, fantasy look is dewy, fresh and very romantic. This design is achieved with a 4 or 5-dimensional cut. The hair is cut in long stems.

KAZAN SAYS "hair should look natural, shiny and beautiful."

"It should never look dyed or tinted," he adds. "There is an art in color." He recommends henna for auburns to brunettes and says reds or "marbled" offer the big fashion look. Marbled is his new term for a frosting technique that looks very natural.

Michel Kazan, a very debonair Frenchman, concluded our interview with these words of wisdom for you: "A woman is only beautiful if she thinks she's beautiful and a woman is only beautiful if she is loved, because then she knows she is beautiful."

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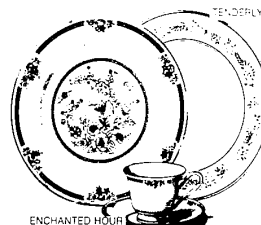
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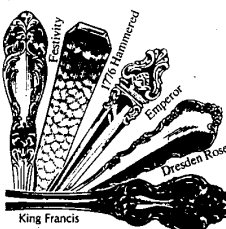
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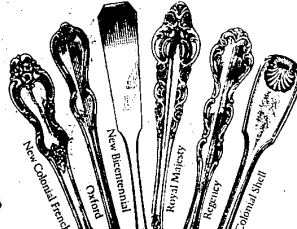
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SA Auxiliary shows styles

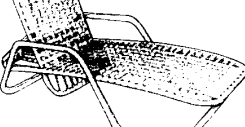

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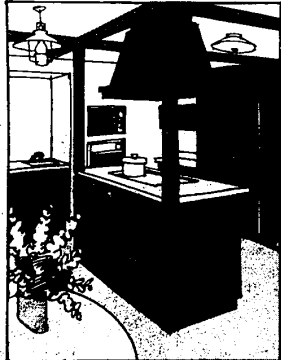
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
