If you want the Milk Commission prices for the entire year on the **Test Plan**, notify us in writing at once; otherwise, without such notice, we will buy on the **Flat Basis**; price then to be the highest yearly average prevailing price in our locality. The average to be as much above prevailing price as conditions will allow (1c per 100 pounds to be taken from announced monthly price and paid over to the Michigan State Producer's Association).

Our December Price is \$4.01 per 100 Pounds, Flat.

Our other rule and regulations remain the same as in 1918. We can use all the good, clean, pure milk that will be delivered to us by our patrons every month in the year, as we have the best of facilities and equipment to handle same, and we will appreciate your patronage all through 1919, and we hope for many years to come.
