Council Proceedings
Farmington, Jan. 6, 1919.
Regular meeting of the Common Council of the Village of Farmington, called to order by President George Francis Monday evening, January 6, 1919, at Council Chambers in Water Works Hall.
Roll call showed the following trustees present: Hogle, Nichols Ely and Webster. Absent Lamb and Walters.

The minutes of the meeting of December 2, 1918, were read and approved.
Trustee Walters present.
President Francis reported that railing had been placed along the road on Grand River east of town where creek crosses; also on Power's avenue, north of Mark Winy's corner, and that graveling had been started on the old Farmington road by town board.
Moved by Trustee Nichols and supported by Trustee Ely that Farmington Township Board be requested to spend money due village from Highway Improvement fund on the old Farmington road from the cement road west on Shawwassee avenue to cemetery. Carried.

Trustee Webster of the sewer committee reported that a delegation of east end people had petitioned for sewer at Junction, and requested him to report to council.
President Francis reported that water mains along Grand River from Crosby's Corners east to Junction were in bad condition and should be relaid with new pipe before paving was started, which would be commenced in the early spring, and the water committee was instructed to make arrangements for repair of same.
No further business appearing, on motion the council adjourned.
